Match of the Month

England 0-1 New Zealand

The stage was set, the sun was shining, the fans were singing but England Lionesses' farewell party did not quite go according to plan.

A shock goal from Sarah Gregorius shortly after the second half had re-started stunned England into defeat in their final friendly before heading out to the Women's World Cup.

Phil Neville made 10 changes from the side which beat Denmark on Saturday, May 25 with only goalscorer Nikita Parris keeping her place in the starting XI.

England started strong, dominating possession with Jodie Taylor, who has not scored for her national side in over a year, missing a couple of early chances.

It looked only a matter of time before England would opening the scoring, but try as they might and the Lionesses could not find the back of the net.

New Zealand goalkeeper Erin Nayler was kept busy in the first half with both Toni Duggan and Fran Kirby forcing saves from long-range shots.

England picked up from where they left off in the second half but on 50 minutes they were caught napping at the back.

The Lionesses' defence failed to clear the ball from the area and goalkeeper Carly Telford failed to get a hold on it leaving Gregorius with an easy save.

It did not take long for the hosts to begin pressing the New Zealand defence again and after winning a free kick on the edge of



the area, Lucy Staniforth's shot dipped just over the bar.

New Zealand, who are ranked 15th in the world, looked much stronger in the second half and had a couple of corners but Millie Bright and Steph Houghton easily kept the game at just 1-0.

Manager Phil Neville decided to change things up a bit with 20 minutes to go, first bringing on Karen Carney who made an immediate impact down the wing before adding Beth Mead and Jill Scott to the mix.

Scott, who scored the second against Denmark, added immediate height in the box and just minutes after coming on found her

head on the ball but the header went just wide of the goal.

With time ticking away, England looked like they were beginning to panic and Neville could easily be heard on the sidelines telling his team to calm down.

In front of a record crowd of over 20,000 England could not find the back of the net but Neville was not feeling too concerned.

He said: "The girls are really disappointed.

"Disappointed I think because it was a really good occasion.

"It was a send-off and they wanted to celebrate more than what they were allowed to do because we lost.

"I stood on the touchline thinking we were doing everything right – we were passing the ball with speed, once they got that goal it was always going to be more difficult, they got deeper and deeper.

"The only slight negative from my point of view was that we were crossing the ball too much.

"We were crossing the ball into areas where they were just stood. What I wanted the players to do was to have more composure, to get the ball into the boxes and to get Kirby, Carney, Mead or Parris on the ball and try and weave the ball rather than crossing the ball into the box.

"Because of their goal it made us a bit anxious in the final third and it felt, even on 75 minutes, that the players started to get desperate and there was still plenty of time.

"We kept trying to get the message on to take those extra passes but I think the occasion and the want to get back into the game meant that they were so desperate and in the end we didn't have enough to break them down.

"In the first 20/30 minutes I thought we should have been two, three up and it could have been a very different story. They just

hit us on a sucker-punch.”

The squad will fly out to France on Tuesday before their opening game on Sunday but will have to put the result behind them quickly.

The players now have a few days off before they all converge on Heathrow airport and Neville is adamant he wants his players to relax on their days off.

He added: “I am not deflated and I think you take your mood off the manager sometimes.

“My lecture after the game was about what are they going to do on their days off.

“I want them to recover, to switch off – see the family, walk the dog. I told them to keep focused.”

The England manager looks back over the 'Road to France' Series and ahead to the Women's World Cup.

The Lionesses have been tipped as one of the favourites for the 2019 Women's World Cup trophy with many fans believing this is their year.

After finishing third in the 2015 competition and winning the SheBelieves Cup in March, excitement has been building ahead of the tournament in France but the preparations have not gone according to plan.

The media anticipation has blown up with many major media outlet in the UK turning up to press events, sending reporters to games and building the excitement and it is all coming down to this – with just days to go until the start of the tournament, Phil Neville chatted to journalists and TWFM about how he thinks preparations have gone.

He said: "The last three weeks we have worked really hard but from three weeks ago all they wanted was to get to Tuesday [then they fly out to France] so we have been counting the days down because Tuesday is where we want to be.

"These games have been a bit of a nuisance really and New Zealand said the same thing.

"Everyone just wants to get to France. I am happy, I am contented. I have seen my

squad play with confidence, with great ability.

"When you are going into a major championship, the warm-up games are really difficult because you want to get your rhythm, you want to get your form, but you have got one eye on getting out to France.

"It is catch-22 for the player because you don't want to get injured but you want to find your form and training has been really good.

"The two games that we have played, you can tell that there has been one eye on getting out to France. It is human nature.

"Every player in every country feels the same. We spoke to New Zealand before the game and their manager Tom [Sermanni] said exactly the same.

"They go to Wales on Tuesday and really they do not want that game. It is about getting minutes but also about getting rest."

The 'Road to France' Series has seen the Lionesses come up against Canada, Spain, Denmark and New Zealand with two defeats and two wins.

In front of growing crowds – with the both the game at the AMEX and Banks Stadium over 10,000 – the Lionesses have played against some tough sides also heading to France.

Back in September, Neville confirmed that he wanted to

play against as many of the top teams in the World before the World Cup started and alongside the SheBelieves Cup, they have achieved it.

Despite this, not everything has gone their way. A defeat to Canada in the first game came as a shock to many fans but then to lose to New Zealand in their 'farewell' game was completely against the bets. Neville, however, is not worried – in fact he believes they are the games where his side have learnt the most.

He said: "The two defeats have been really good for us – the Canada one especially.

"We came up against a really experienced side who knew how to win games of football, knew how to dig in and were tactically astute so it was really important.

"I think it has actually been the most important game.

"When we get through the round-of-16, the quarter-final stages, we are going to meet teams who are tactical, we are not just going to meet teams who are good at football.

"There is going to be a lot of different types of challenges and we need to be prepared.

"There will be teams who double up on our wide players so they have been great challenges."

England vs Scotland— A preview

Injury Watch, form and possible line-ups for England vs Scotland including quotes from Phil Neville and Shelley Kerr

As we countdown to England's first game against Scotland, we look ahead to how we think both England and Scotland will line-up.

Phil Neville confirmed after the New Zealand game that there were a number of players with knocks, which was why they did not feature for the Lionesses in Brighton but he did not seem to be concerned.

He said: "We have four injuries at the minute so we are going to have to be really careful with them.

"Demi Stokes, Rachel Daly, Mary Earps and Jade Moore were not involved [against New Zealand].

"Demi picked up a knock in the Denmark game, and the other three picked up in knocks in training.

"It is the reason we brought in Hannah Blundell in to training this week, she will obviously go home again now.

"The injuries are minor knocks, we are not going to have to change the squad, but I always like the whole 23 squad training every day.

“They [are not a worry for the game against Scotland], they will hopefully back training Wednesday or Thursday.”

When it comes to form and predicted line-ups for the game in Nice it is harder as Phil Neville has loved to change things throughout his reign as manager.

In 2019, Neville has swapped his side around including playing Lucy Bronze in midfield and never having the same upfront team, leaving fans unsure whether he knows his best squad.

Just look at the table below to see how many different combinations there have been of starting XIs in 2019.

Against Canada, Jodie Taylor – who was the Golden Boot winner at the 2015 Women’s World Cup in Canada – missed a number of golden opportunities to put the Lionesses ahead but she could not find the back of the net.

It has now been over a year since Taylor has scored in an England shirt, but Neville is not concerned about her form in the lead up to the tournament.

He said: “I am not worried about my goalscorers because I know they will get chances. I thought Jodie [Taylor] should have scored two [against New Zealand] and she would have said the same.

“She was out for a long time, she did not really get back playing until January/February then she got back into England in the SheBelieves.

“She is still finding her rhythm but I think she is a big game player. When the occasion comes, I know she will score goals.”

Looking at Scotland and it is clear they are going to bring much more of a test to England than many were originally predicting.

The rivals met in the opening game of the European Championships in 2017, but since then Scottish football has gone from strength-to-strength with the likes of domestic clubs such as Celtic confirming plans for their women's teams to become full-time professionals.

The Scotland squad includes a number of Women's Super League players including domestic treble winners Jennifer Beattie, Claire Emslie and Caroline Weir and champions Kim Little and Lisa Evans.

Scotland's final warm-up game before they head to their debut WWC, saw them beat Jamaica 3-2 at Hampden Park in front of a record crowd.

Before the game the record had been just over 4000, but 18,655 people crammed into Hampden Park to watch the side win before they head out to France.

The result means they will go into the tournament full of confidence and unbeaten in their last four games.

Shelley Kerr's side have been busy in 2019 playing four friendlies and coming fifth in the Algarve Cup but their squad has been consistent throughout.

Speaking after their win over Jamaica, Kerr said that the support at Hampden Park is the perfect send-off: "To generate that kind of support is amazing.

"I grew up in an era when we had two leagues and a couple of hundred players than 1000 at international matches.

"So to play at Hampden before the World Cup with over 18,000 is magnificent."

Lucy Bronze talks to TWFM

How do you feel about finishing on a defeat?

The score was frustrating but the performance definitely wasn't. We played some very good chances, probably a lot more than we usually do, we just did not put them away. One little slip up and they scored so I don't think I am too disappointed with the game. It's a friendly, it's a wake-up call and just shows what work we need to do this week.

Does it worry you the lack of goals up front?

[Laughing]: "Absolutely not. We played against Denmark the other day and scored two goals when we were not playing at our best so it shows we have goals in us. We can go away and work on that and we will be fine. We have some of the best strikers in the world, some top players and we know that we can create chances and put them away."

Did it feel like a reverse on Denmark?

No, we fought hard against Denmark. I thought in the second half we were the better team [against Denmark]. Today, I believe we were the better team throughout the whole game, apart from the last two minutes of the first half and the first two minutes of the second.

How was it playing in front of 20,000?

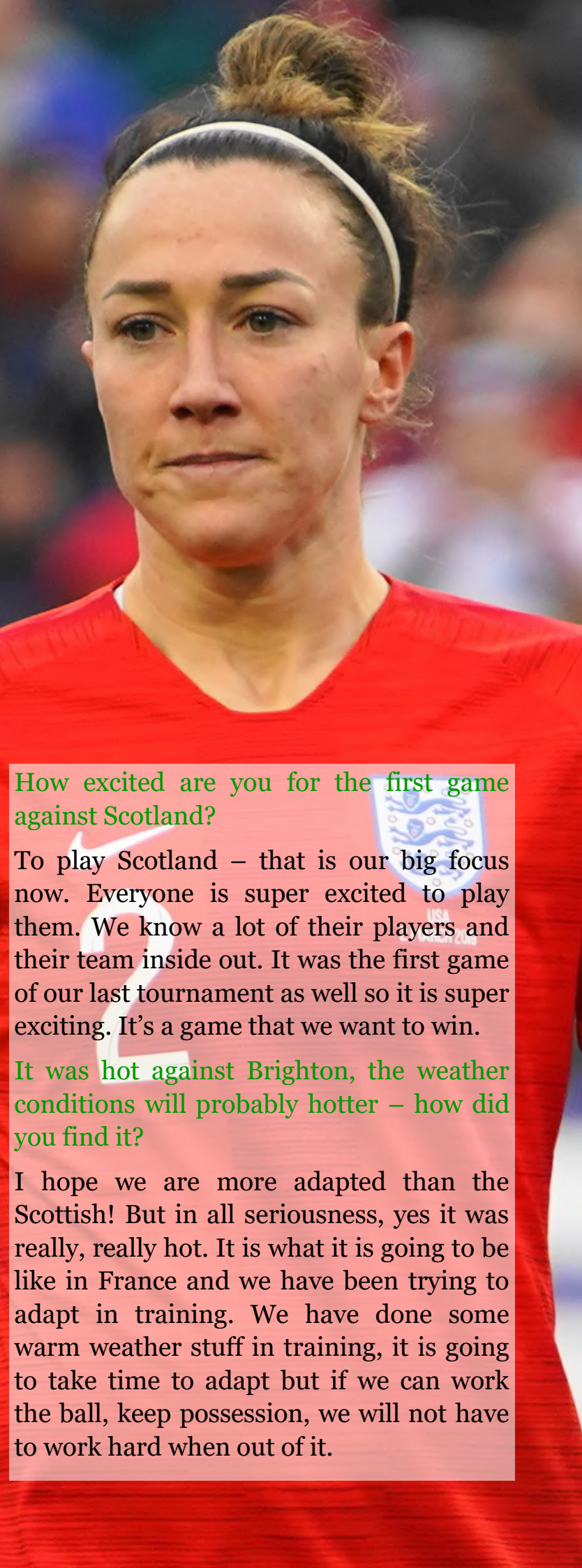
It was amazing. The stadium itself is unbelievable. It's a nice stadium to play in, we nearly filled it. The crowd was good and the atmosphere was good. Hopefully, it's a practice run for Nice.

How excited are you for the first game against Scotland?

To play Scotland – that is our big focus now. Everyone is super excited to play them. We know a lot of their players and their team inside out. It was the first game of our last tournament as well so it is super exciting. It's a game that we want to win.

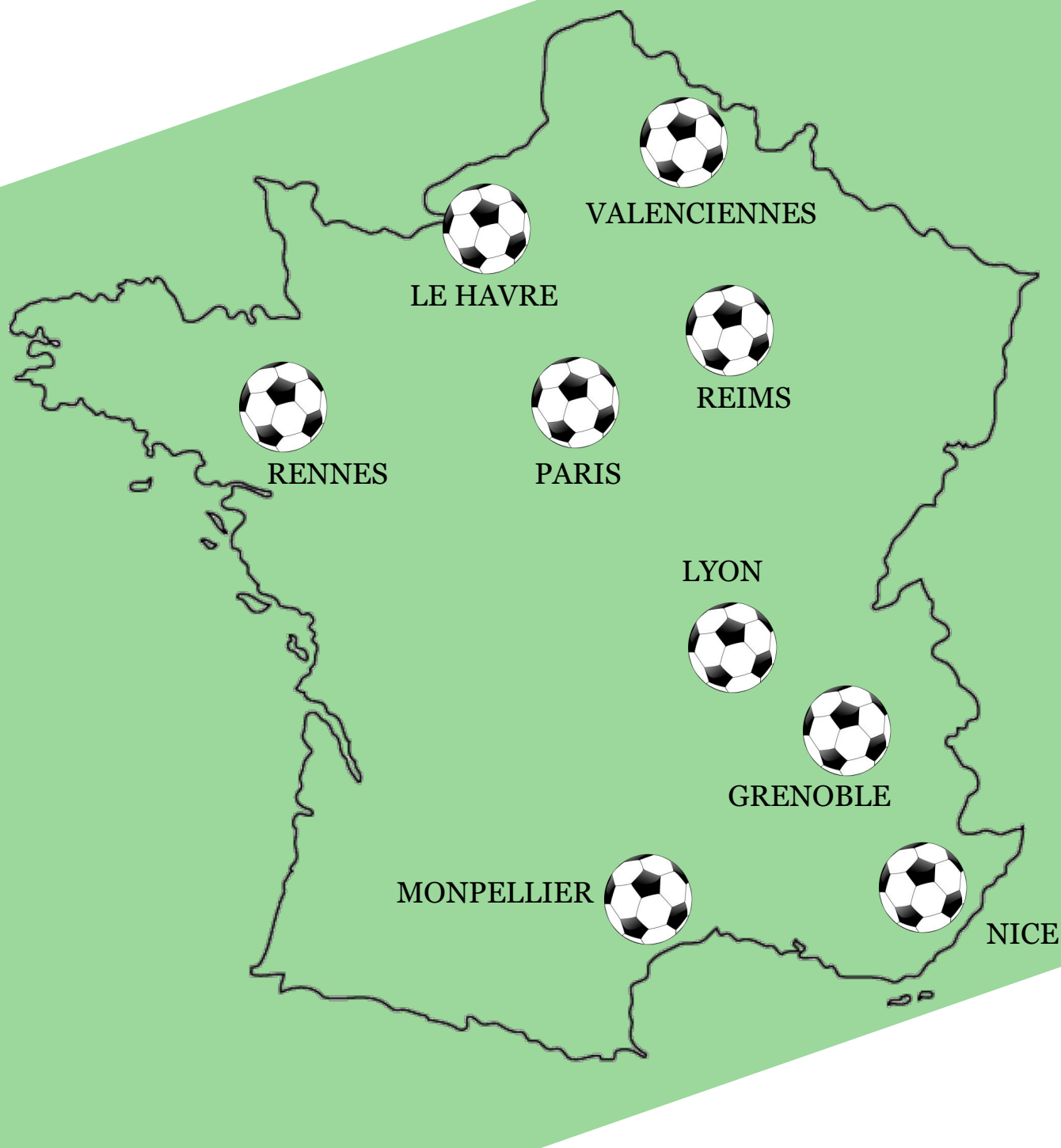
It was hot against Brighton, the weather conditions will probably be hotter – how did you find it?

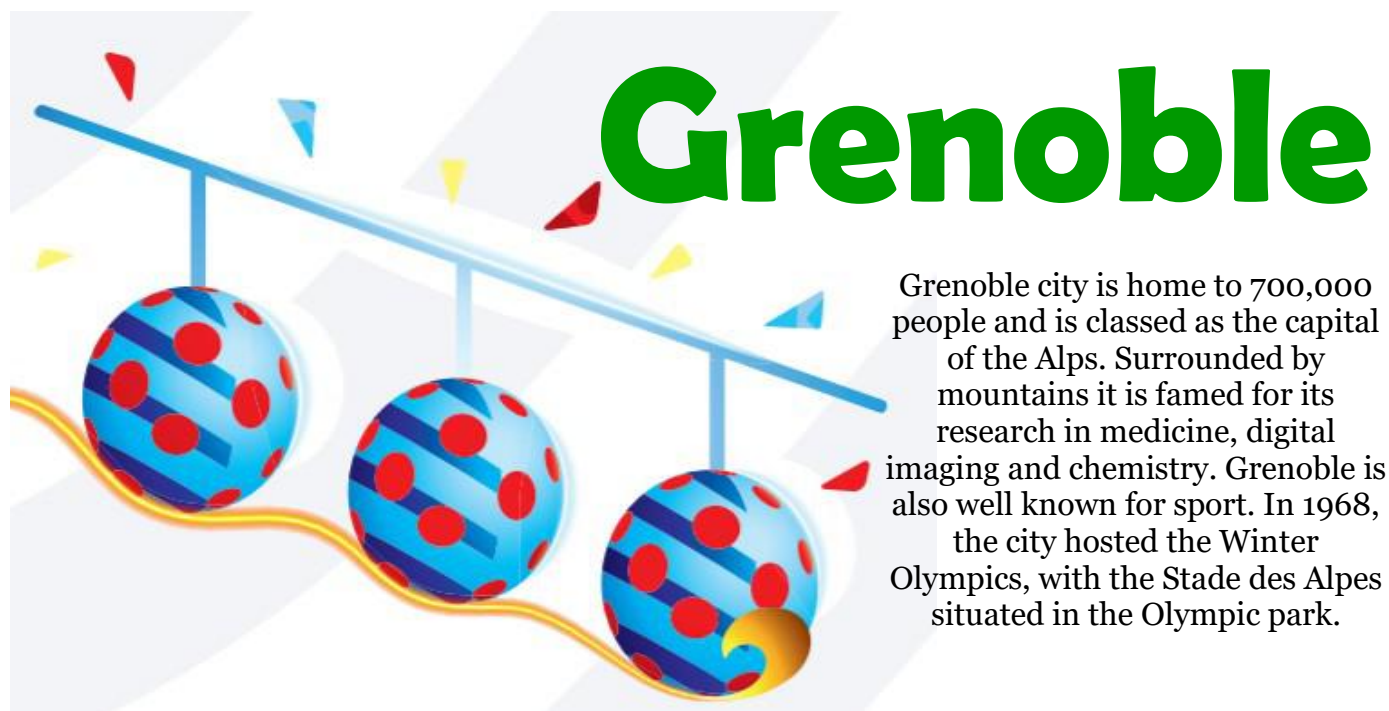

How to get there from the city centre?

The stadium is located to the south-east of the centre and next to the City Hall. It is a 10 minute walk from the cathedral and about a 30 minute walk from the main train station. If you do not want to walk you can get the A tram towards Denis Papin and get off at Verdun Prefecture.

Le Havre



Le Havre port was founded in 1517 by King Francis 1 to strengthen trading links with western Europe. Since then it has suffered destruction during the second world war which saw massive rebuilding by famous architect Auguste Perret. In 2015, it was declared a UNESCO World Heritage site. Le Havre Athletic Club was founded in 1894 and is the oldest club in France.

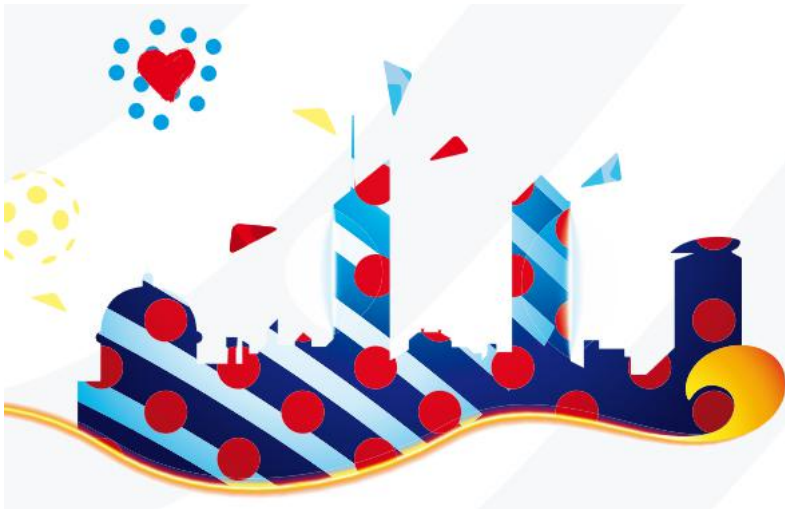
How to get there from the city centre?

The stadium lies to the east of the City. From the centre you can get buses to the ground. From the cathedral grab Bus 2 in the direction of Soquence and get off at Dr Lamaze. From the main railway station catch Bus 5 towards Gravelle. Get off at Champs Barets.

If you are driving, the stadium is adjacent to the RD6015 which you get to via the A131 from the city.

Lyon

How to get there from the city centre?

The stadium is located 10km out of the city centre and easy to get to by car. It is located next to the N346 motorway—take exit 6.

For public transport take Tram 3 from Gare Part-Dieu and get off at Decines Grand Large. It is a ten minute walk from there. On match days there are usually special trams which stop outside the stadium so look out for them!

Lyon is well known for its cuisine, the rolling hills of La Croix Rousse and the Fete des Lumieres which lights the city's parks and monuments during December. Situated on the banks of the Rhone and Saone, Lyon is a lively place and home to renowned women's club Olympique Lyon Feminin who have nurtured some of the best footballers in the world.

Montpellier



Montpellier is a popular holiday destination for many in France and Europe with the historic attractions which surround the city. UNESCO Heritage sites such as the Pont du Gard, the ancient abbeys and beautiful scenery means there is a lot to explore. The city has heavily invested in sport with professional men's and women's football, rugby and handball teams known as some of the best in France.

How to get there from the city centre?

If travelling by car, take the A9 motorway and come off at exit 31. The stadium is signposted from there.

For public transport, take Tram 1 from the main railway station and get off at Mosson—the last on the line. It takes about half an hour.

How to get there from the city centre?

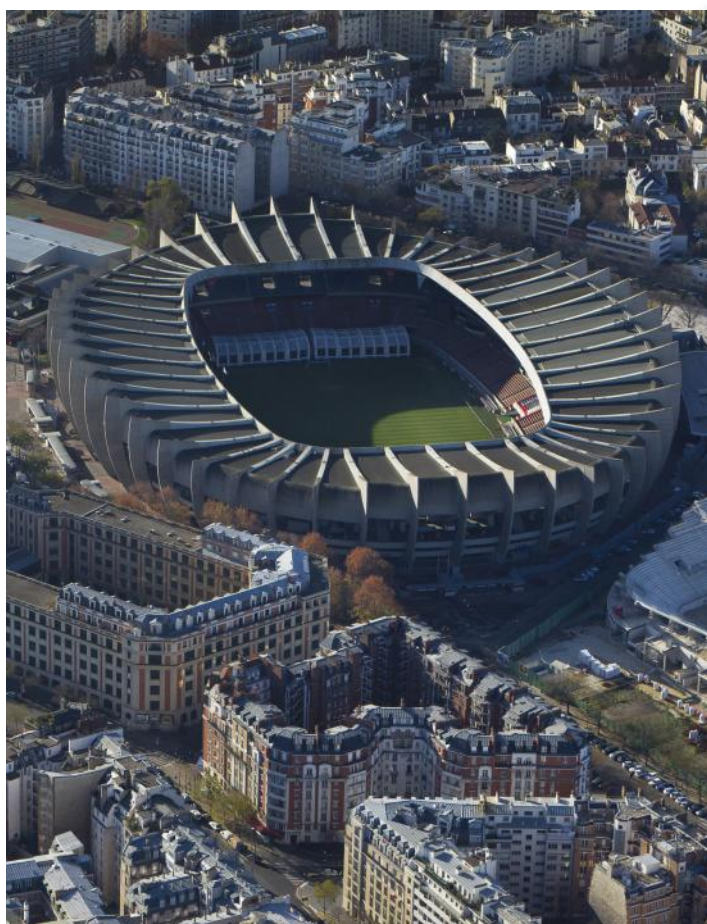
The stadium is 10km out of the city centre and on the A8 motoway—take exit 51 or 52 for the car parks.

On matchdays get Bus 95 which runs from Hopital St Roch and takes you out to the stadium—it takes about 50 minutes. Alternatively take the TER train from Nice Ville to St Augustain and there are shuttle buses from there.

Reims

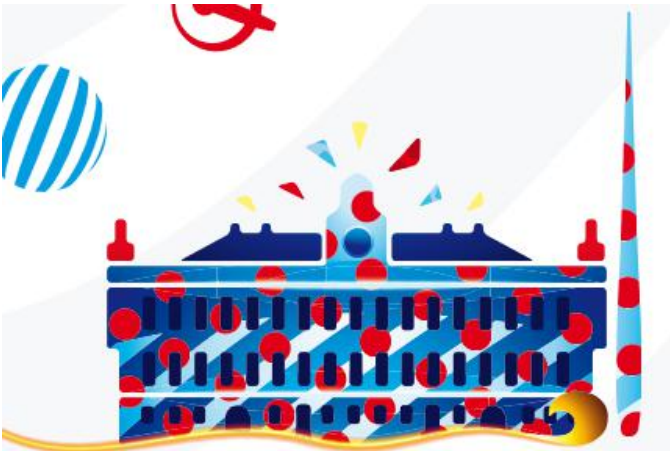
How to get there from the city centre?

Valenciennes

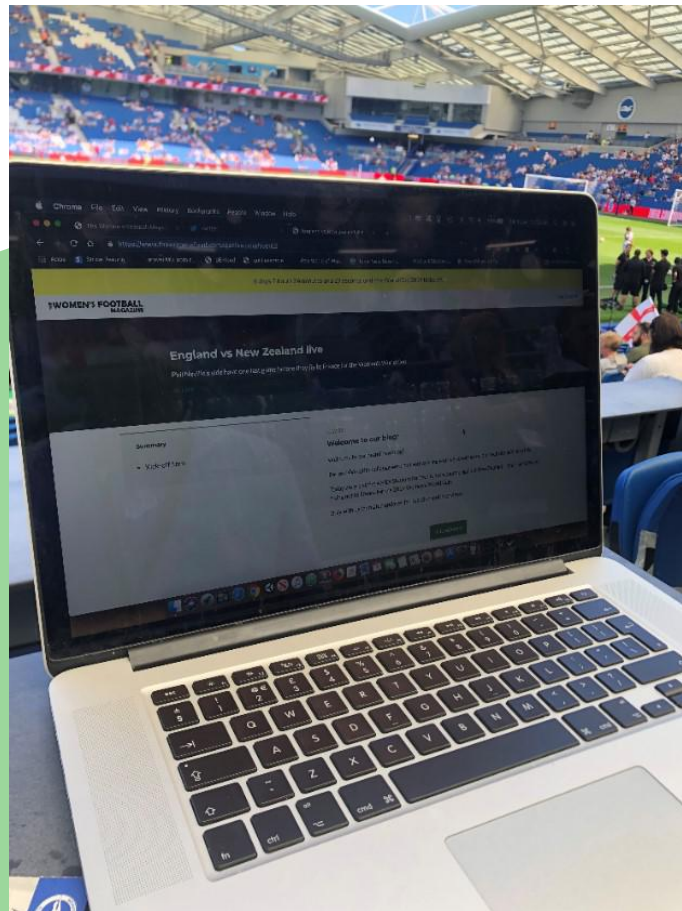

Five young stars to watch out for at the Women's World Cup

Mary Fowler - Australia (16)

When Australia kick off their campaign against Italy, Mary Fowler will be 16 years and 115 days old. If she appears at any point during the tournament, The Matildas prodigy will become the fifth-youngest player in Women's World Cup history behind Nigerian Ifeanyi Chiejine (16 years & 34 days in 1999), Mexican Monica Vergara (16 & 53 in 1999), New Zealander Annalie Longo (16 & 76 in 2007) and Russian Elena Danilova (16 and 107 in 2003).

Fowler is a talented and clever player, an out and out striker and is able to use both feet. She has plenty of growth to do, but this should be an excellent experience for the youngster to shine. Australia are seen by many as dark horses and Fowler could have a big part to play if the Matildas are to match or better their last three quarter-final finishes.

Javiera Grez - Chile (18)

Javiera Grez will turn 19 just four days after the World Cup concludes. The Chilean forward is part of a side making their debut at the tournament. Last year, she represented her country at the South American Women's Championship in which Chile failed to get out of their group.

However, Grez was part of the side that finished runners-up at the Copa America Femenina. The Chile forward plays her club football for Curico Unido. Interestingly, Grez has been registered as the shortest player of the 552 players set to partake in the tournament, coming in at just 148cm.

Erin Cuthbert - Scotland (20)

Cuthbert has had a great season with Chelsea Women, scoring eight league goals at a rate of 174 minutes per goal and providing five assists. She has been pivotal to the side throughout the season and scored in the first leg of Chelsea's semi-final defeat against Lyon. The Scotland international was one of three WSL players to have been shortlisted for both the PFA Women's Players' Player of the Year and the Young Player of the Year gong.

Scotland will be at the World Cup for the first time and at the age of 20, Cuthbert is a key component in the Scotland side. Cuthbert made history at the 2017 Uefa Women's EURO when she scored Scotland's first goal at a major women's tournament. Cuthbert's best attribute is her work rate which will be put to the test against Group D opponents England, Argentina and Japan.

Linda Motlhalo - South Africa (20)

The South African midfielder made 21 appearances for Houston Dash in 2018, her first professional move, scoring once and providing one assist before moving to Chinese Women's Super League side Beijing Phoenix. There are already whispers that Motlhalo could be a huge star, thanks to her eye for going forward and playing penetrative passes.

Banyana Banyana are unlikely to make it out of Group B which contains Germany, Spain and China. Despite this, Motlhalo has plenty of experience with the senior

the senior side and will learn valuable lessons from hers and South Africa's first World Cup.

Khadija Shaw - Jamaica (22)

One of Jamaica's best players, Khadija Shaw will grace the big stage as captain of her national team. Shaw was voted Guardian Footballer of the Year for 2018 and could earn herself a big move if she impresses in France. Shaw and her Jamaican team-mates have already created history as they are the first

Caribbean team to reach the FIFA Women's World Cup.

In Jamaica's last warm-up match before the tournament, Shaw bagged a brace as Scotland won 3-2 against The Reggae Girlz. As the face of the senior side, all eyes will be on the captain to see if she can help her country progress past the group stages.

Sarina Wiegman – Netherlands manager

The Netherlands went from winning the 2017 European Championship to just scrapping through to this year's World Cup.

But from the highs of hosting the Euros, they have had to re-build and manager Sarina Wiegman was pleased to finish their friendlies with a 3-0 win over Australia.

The Netherlands boss sat down with 'de Volkskrant' in the run-up to the tournament.

How do you feel things have changed for the Netherlands since the Euros win?

"Much has changed after winning the European Championship.

"There is pressure, people think: oh, easy draw for the coming World Cup, we are going to win.

"They have no idea.

"Understandably, they measure it according to the men's ranking. A team like Canada is nothing, but their women's team is the absolute top. That pressure can be difficult.

"In the media I protect the group, but we have to move forward during preparation.

"We are now in a different phase and are being appreciated for the first time for football. Fans want to make selfies with the players before we train.

"Half an hour, we say, no longer. Some find that difficult because they don't want to disappoint people. They want to be liked."

What has changed in your preparations?

"We now mainly want to work on the team, they have to do it together.

"In preparation for the 2017 European Championship, we talked a whole day, the subject was the question: what do you give up for success?

"One told something, the other had made a movie or sang a song. We laughed terribly. In this way they get to know each other in a different way, not just in the field.

"We have 23 and they are all different in terms of background, interest and education. We take this into account when explaining something.

"We do that with abstract concepts, but you also look for metaphors, so that they can imagine something concrete.

"People learn in different ways and you want everyone to understand."
