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WOMEN'S SUPER LEAGUE



How has every WSL team got on after five games?

The Women's Super League (WSL) is in full flow and it is set to be one of the best seasons yet. Arsenal are top of the league while Bristol City are languishing at the bottom. How is each WSL team looking after five games?

Arsenal

Joe Montemurro's side have a perfect record after five games with 29 goals scored. The Gunners have won all of the games they would be expected to win so far, with thrashings against Reading, West Ham, Brighton and Tottenham Hotspur. Bristol City were only beaten 3-1 by Arsenal and have given them the toughest game thus far. The main criticism of Arsenal so far is that they have just one clean sheet from their first five matches. Furthermore, having a

small squad which is prone to injuries will prove costly as the season goes on.

Mark out of 10 so far: 9

Aston Villa (played three games)

It has been a rude awakening to the top flight for Aston Villa. The newly promoted side are pointless after three games against Manchester City, Reading and Everton. They were thrashed 6-0 by Everton and have so far been unable to impose themselves on any of the matches they have played. One of their first team squad members tested positive for coronavirus and with several other players having come into close contact with the player, the Football Association agreed to postpone the club's next two fixtures. Their next match is against Brighton and a much-improved performance will be

required if they are to get off the mark in the WSL.

Mark out of 10 so far: 2

Birmingham City

After losing three consecutive matches, Birmingham City have picked up six points from six with wins over Reading and Bristol City. It is the first time since 2018 that Birmingham have claimed back-to-back league wins and while it may have taken some time for Carla Ward to get her ideas across, the improvements are clear to see and there will be hope that another relegation threatened season is not on the horizon.

Mark out of 10 so far: 5

Brighton & Hove Albion

Brighton have made an impressive start to the season so far with manager Hope Powell named Barclays Women's Super League manager of the month for September. Albion beat Birmingham City 2-0 and drew 0-0 with last season's runners-up Manchester City. They lost their next two matches before a 2-2 draw against Everton in which Kayleigh Green was not sent off for Brighton despite being shown two yellow cards. Brighton have the quality to trouble teams around them and should be looking to improve on two consecutive 9th placed finishes.

Mark out of 10 so far: 4

Bristol City (played four games)

Another season of struggle is on the cards for a winless Bristol City. They have lost all four of their WSL games and have just one goal to their name. The 9-0 thrashing against Chelsea was a particular low point for Tanya Oxtoby's side but Bristol City have been under par overall and with Manchester City as their next opponents, things could get worse before they get better.

Mark out of 10 so far: 1

Chelsea (played four games)

Since drawing with Manchester United in their opening match, defending champions Chelsea have won three consecutive games. They have



already defeated Man City, one of their main title rivals, as well as a 9-0 demolition of Bristol City where nine different goalscorers highlighted the depth in Emma Hayes' squad.

Mark out of 10 so far: 7

Everton

Second in the league behind leaders Arsenal, Everton have been superb this term. The Toffees have multiple goalscorers who can share the load, a team that works well together, a driven manager and the desire to succeed. There is every chance that Willie Kirk's side can break into the established 'Big Three' of Arsenal, Chelsea and Manchester City if they keep up their stunning start to the season.

Mark out of 10 so far: 8

Manchester City

An inconsistent set of results thus far has left Manchester City in fifth place, a position that is unfamiliar to them given the success they have experienced in recent years. Draws against Reading and Brighton as well as a defeat at the hands of Chelsea has seen Man City ensure an underwhelming start. There is plenty of time for things to change but Man City look vulnerable this season and their rivals will look to capitalise.

Mark out of 10 so far: 6

Manchester United

Everton have the quality to challenge the 'Big Three' and so do Man United. Casey Stoney's side are joint second with the Toffees and have put in some sensational showings to date. Since drawing with Chelsea in their first match, Man United are on a four-game winning streak and they look unstoppable. The Red Devils have triumphed against Birmingham, Brighton, Tottenham and West Ham. American superstars Christen Press and Tobin Heath have added star quality to an already skilful side and they will be crucial in Man United's bid to better last season's fourth-placed finish.

Mark out of 10 so far: 8

Reading

Reading bounced back from a heavy defeat

against Arsenal to win two consecutive games over Aston Villa and West Ham. The next result was a narrow defeat against Birmingham. A draw with Man City shows that Reading can compete against the top sides in the league on their day and if they can produce more consistent performances, a mid-table finish should be achievable.

Mark out of 10 so far: 6

Tottenham Hotspur

Alex Morgan may be a superstar but by the time she makes an appearance for Tottenham it could already be too late. Spurs, like West Ham, have a solitary point to their name and have been unable to impose themselves on any of the games they have played. Spurs had an impressive debut campaign in the WSL but the second season is proving a lot harder than the first.

Mark out of 10 so far: 2

West Ham United

Just one point after five games is an incredibly poor return for a talented West Ham side. Defeats at the hands of Arsenal, Everton, Manchester United and Reading have left the Hammers in the bottom three with no idea where their first three points of the season are going to come from. Another inconsistent season looks likely for a team that cannot maximise their obvious ability.

Karen Hills self-isolating after Covid-19 contact

Tottenham Hotspur joint head coach Karen Hills is self-isolating.

The Spurs coach has been forced to stay at home after coming into contact with someone who has tested positive for Covid-19.

Despite having a negative test “in the last few days” she must self isolate for 14 days.

This means she will be forced to miss Spurs Continental League Cup tie at Chelsea on Tuesday, November 3.

Hills’ fellow joint head coach Juan Amoros will take charge of the side for the game.

Spurs are yet to win in the Super League this season.

The FA have been carrying out weekly Covid-19 tests in the Women’s Super League and the Women’s Championship.

Between October 19 and October 25, 699 tests were carried out, 10 returned positive.

WSL September round-up

October saw a busy month for many teams with league, cup and international matches for many players. Here is a round-up of the WSL action for the month.



Arsenal

Arsenal found themselves a goal down in the sixth minute in their first game of the month against Bristol. A mistake at the back gave their opponents possession with a tame shot creeping past Zinsberger. The Gunners struggled to play with their usual flare and ease, but persistence paid off just before the whistle for half time when Nobbs went through on goal and calmly scored the equaliser. Foord scored Arsenal's second

putting them ahead with Miedema finishing the game after a clever finish with the outside of her foot.

A comfortable win as Arsenal faced Brighton, two goals from Miedema plus goals from van de Donk, Beattie and Wubben-Moy meant Arsenal maintained their 100% start to the season.

The Gunners faced Tottenham next, a dominant first half saw the reds score five goals with a hat-trick from Miedema. Miedema's hat-trick means she becomes the first player to score 50 goals in the WSL beating Nikita Parris' record of 49.

Tottenham had a chance to get a goal back, but Arsenal keeper Zinsberger saved Dean's penalty. Foord then grabbed her second to give Arsenal six. Lucia Leon headed in a late consolation for Tottenham.

Aston Villa



A tough month for the newly promoted side which saw them play one game and lose. Raso scored the first two for Everton, capitalising on a mistake from keeper Lisa Weiss to score the second. The goals kept coming for Everton as Emslie curled in the third and a diving header from Gauvin gave them the fourth. With Everton scoring two more goals to make the deficit six, Gemma Davies' side are still looking for their first win of the season. Aston Villa's game against Chelsea was postponed due to Covid-19.

Birmingham City



In City's first game of the month, they played Chelsea. Next, Birmingham faced Reading, the home side were dominant throughout having several chances on goal. Birmingham then stunned Reading as Claudia Walker scored against the run of play after finishing a cross from Sarah Mayling. Birmingham's winning streak

continued as they faced Bristol. Corsie scoring the first with a header and Green getting the second. Claudia Walker then curled in a beautiful shot for the third and Murray scoring the fourth from the penalty spot. However, this good form stopped once Arsenal got their first goal when Miedema found the bottom corner from 20 yards out. After this Arsenal were unstoppable. An unusual game to watch as Brighton faced Everton, despite some nice play and two goals from both teams it will be remembered after Brighton forward Kayleigh Green was cautioned twice but not dismissed.

However, despite this strong start West Ham were gifted an equaliser when Everton were too casual in defence allowing Dali to score. West Ham grew in confidence after their goal, but Everton were more clinical in front of goal. Graham's glorious strike hit the top corner to make it 2-1 and then she made sure the game was over getting her second in extra time. A strange game for Everton as they saw opposition player Kayleigh Green receive two yellow cards but remain on the pitch. The Toffees went behind after Sevecke scored an own goal, but Everton regained the lead with goals from Christiansen and Gauvin. Whelan scored late for Brighton to see both teams take away a point.

A-Z of the WSL (Part One)

The 2020-21 season is now well and truly underway, and although we may not be able to get up close and personal to the action this time round, there is still plenty to keep us excited in what is quite possibly, the biggest year of the league so far.

So, let us steer you toward key players, pioneers and points, as we run you through a full A to Z of the Women's Super League.

A is for Arsenal

The North London giants have long dominated in the world of women's football and have hordes of silverware to their name. The Gunners treasures include 3 WSL titles, 12 Premier League National Division titles, 5 Continental Cups, a mammoth 14 FA Cups

and they also carry the honour of being the only English side to have ever won the UEFA Champions League. Arsenal have certainly started their season with a bang; big score lines, numerous hat tricks, and Vivianne Miedema's history making 50th goal all conclude that there is no doubt, Joe Montemurro's Gunners are gunning for that top spot.

A is for Aston Villa

Newly promoted Aston Villa have a tall order establishing themselves in their inaugural year in the top division. Villa gained promotion from the Championship after being unbeaten all season, and although the step up is a vast one, the Villans are not to be written off too soon. In their opener against Manchester City, Villa defended exceptionally well and kept City on their toes. Although they ultimately

conceded two goals, they were by no means, outplayed.

B is for Birmingham City

Birmingham City needed a shake up after finding themselves close to relegation last season. Cue, Carla Ward. The Blue's new manager has certainly taken the bull by the horns and breathed a fresh lease of life into the previously struggling side. Already Birmingham have impressed with their solid defensive work, as well as some outstanding individual performances, notably from newly acquired defender Rachel Corsie, midfielder Christine Murray and forward Claudia Walker.

B is for Brighton & Hove Albion

Former England manager, Hope Powell, heads up Brighton in her third year at the helm. After ending the 2019-2020 season in the latter half of the table, the Seagulls will be looking to climb to a middle position. True to this ethos, Brighton have made an admirable start, bagging a win and two draws from their first five games. Powell is developing a dangerous looking team, additions such as the technically gifted Denise O'Sullivan, bringing an impactful strength to the side this season.

B is for Bristol City

Tanya Oxtoby's Bristol City have work to do to keep them out of the relegation zone this season. The Robins finished in tenth place last year, and will be looking to achieve the same this time round. Although they can find themselves on the back end of some big score lines, Bristol are capable of producing some very good play, as seen in their early match against Arsenal, in which they contained the Gunners with solidarity and even managed to sink a goal past Manuela Zinsberger. The Robins' keeper Sophie Baggaley is a rising talent and is certainly one to keep your eye on.



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C is for Chelsea



The reigning champions not only won last year's league title, but also the Continental Cup and the reinstated Community Shield. The London Blues have brought in leading names across the year to defend their growing trophy cabinet. The signings of Sam Kerr, Melanie Leupolz, Niamh Charles and Pernille Harder have taken the staggering depth of Emma Hayes' squad to a whole new level of primacy. Chelsea flaunt what is a rather pleasant dilemma, having at least two players for each position at any one time. In short, what Hayes is building is arguably, one of the best sides in the world.

D is for Gemma Davies



Aston Villa's Gemma Davies, leads her team into the WSL as the league's youngest manager. At just 28, Davies heads up the Villans in top tier after an outstanding season in the Championship. Davies has acquired former Chelsea defender Anita Asante to add to her ranks, which already include former WSL players Emma Follis and Chloe Arthur. Davies has a tough stint ahead of her, but after such a remarkable run last year, there is no doubt that she is up to the job.

E is for Everton



Everton have been the surprise of the season so far, seriously challenging for a higher position in the table after finishing a reputable sixth last year. Willie Kirk's side have attacked the early part of the season with an appetite that looks to threaten the leagues typically expected outcome. Australia's Hayley Raso, Scotland's Clare Emslie and France's Valérie Gauvin have brought with them an added energy and flair, making the Toffee's all the more exciting to watch.

F is for Fara Williams MBE



Reading's anchor, Fara Williams, is one of the league's, and the country's, most experienced players. She is the Lionesses' most capped player of all time, having made 172 appearances so far, and is well on her way to achieving the same in the domestic league. The midfielder is renowned for her passing accuracy and merciless free kicks. Williams' name should be known far and wide; she is an endless pioneer of the women's game, her continued resilience and courage an inspiration to many.



G is for Goalkeeping

Perhaps sometimes a little overlooked for their efforts, goalkeepers can often take the brunt of a bad day. Yet undeterred by such woes, the WSL boasts some rather fine work between the posts. Whether it is the developing gifts of Manchester City's Ellie Roebuck, Birmingham City's Hannah Hampton, Bristol City's Sophie Baggaley, Aston Villa's Sian Rogers or Reading's Grace Maloney; the growing expertise of Arsenal's Manuela Zinsberger, Tottenham's Becky Spencer or Manchester United's Mary Earps; the experience of Chelsea duo Ann-Katrin Berger and Carly Telford; or City's trusted Karen Bardsley; there is never a shortage of goalkeeping talent on display.

H is for Lauren Hemp

Manchester City forward, Lauren Hemp, had a magnificent season last year, so much so that she received her first senior call-up and subsequent debut for the Lionesses. Hemp was a standout player in England's SheBelieves campaign, in which she ran rings around a certain World Cup winning side. With an instinct that sees her attack games with a proficiency, vigour and pace that is incomprehensible at times, Hemp is most certainly one to watch.

I is for Sophie Ingle

Wales captain, Sophie Ingle, is one that doesn't necessarily jump out at you, yet the Chelsea midfielder is one of the league's most accomplished players. Ingle is calm, she is collected and she does her job with such little fuss that sometimes one neglects to remember just how important she is. Ingle safeguards Chelsea, quietly dictating from the middle. But just to make sure we're not resting easy, every now and again, she'll treat us to a piece of Ingle magic and net an absolute screamer.

J is for Ji So-Yun

Chelsea's Ji So-Yun is quite simply a force to be reckoned with. Her movement, vision and

and creativity are astonishing, and when given the freedom to roam there is no stopping her. The midfielder effortlessly makes the most challenging of scenarios seem positively easy to navigate. To compare her to another is difficult, but it would be fair to say that, although they are rare, Ji's bad days are still overtly favourable by anybody else's standard's.

K is for Kim Little



Arsenal captain, Kim Little, is a player that needs no introduction. Often regarded as one of the most difficult players to come up against, Arsenal's play is elevated just that little (pardon the pun!) bit further when she is on the field. Not the most vocal of leaders, Little instead leads by example, letting her feet do the talking. Her exemplary passing ability and movement concur with her ever-present vision, causing her to be one of the league's most dangerous playmakers.

L is for Lucy Bronze



England defender Lucy Bronze is widely, and rightfully, considered as one of the best right backs in the world. Bronze has returned to the WSL with former club Manchester City after a three-year spell with French Champions Olympique Lyonnais. Bronze's time at Lyon was nothing short of remarkable, and she ended her time there as the only English

player in history to have won three consecutive Champions League titles. The fullback is perilous in every game she plays.

M is for Manchester City



Finishing in second place last season, Manchester City are aiming high, playing to keep their place in the "top three" after dominance in the past few years. New boss, Gareth Taylor inherited a fine side from the recently departed Nick Cushing, including no less than twelve Lionesses. City managed to secure a number of big names in their transfer window, including defender Lucy Bronze, USA midfielders Sam Mewis and Rose Lavelle and Everton's star striker, Chloe Kelly. Mewis and Kelly, in particular, have caused problems for oppositions and look to be very influential indeed.

M is for Manchester United



Casey Stoney's Red Devil's certainly look to mean business this year. After respectably finishing in fourth place last season, United's six incredibly strong summer signings could very well see them begin to give the "top three" a run for their money. As recruitment goes, Stoney has pulled out all the stops, signing Spanish defender Ona Battle, German forward Ivana Fuso, Lionesses Lucy Staniforth and Alessia Russo, as well as world champions Tobin Heath and Christen Press.

Miedema takes the top spot

Sunday 18th October 2020 saw Arsenal's Vivianne Miedema become the Women's Super League's all-time top-goal scorer.

A big game called for a big performance, and Arsenal certainly rose to the occasion, reigning triumphant over North London rivals Tottenham Hotspur. Katie McCabe converted a free-kick, Caitlin Foord bagged herself a brace and Miedema managed to net a hat-trick in the gunners 6-1 victory.

Ahead of the match, Dutch international, Miedema, sat level pegging with England and Lyon striker, Nikita Parris as the league's top goal scorer. Before her move to France, Parris led the goalscoring table with 49 goals in 110 games.

In comparison, Miedema now has 52 goals in 50 games. Not only this, but she is also the first player to score two first half hat-tricks in WSL history and boasts the highest number of goals for her country, for both the men's and women's sides.

With an array of scoring and creating abilities, Miedema is no one-trick pony. She is able to

feed balls to others, find space to create opportunities, and is of course, clinical with her finish. Miedema is paramount to Arsenal's rhythm, and it is when they find this groove, that she can seem somewhat unstoppable.

In what could aptly be described as an 'Arsenal ambush' back in December 2019, Miedema was involved in a mammoth 10 goals against Bristol City. Two hat-tricks and four assists meant that Miedema missed out on only one in their 11-1 win.

Looking forward, it is hard to imagine that Miedema will cease to reach even greater milestones. Following Miedema's record break, Arsenal boss, Joe Montemurro commented on her drive and ambition for future success.

"Her ability to be better is there. She can get better. She's a person who wants to get better, she wants to challenge herself, she wants to be even better, because there's still a lot of learning and development to go", he said.

One would certainly echo this and hope that Montemurro is right in his forecasts.

At 24, Vivianne Miedema still has plenty left to give.



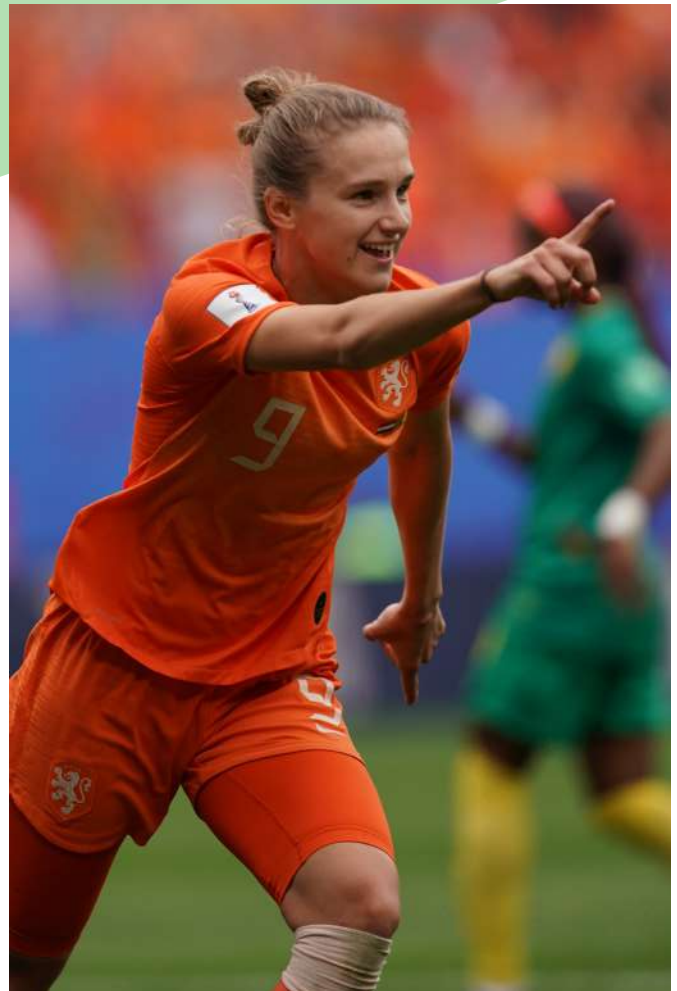

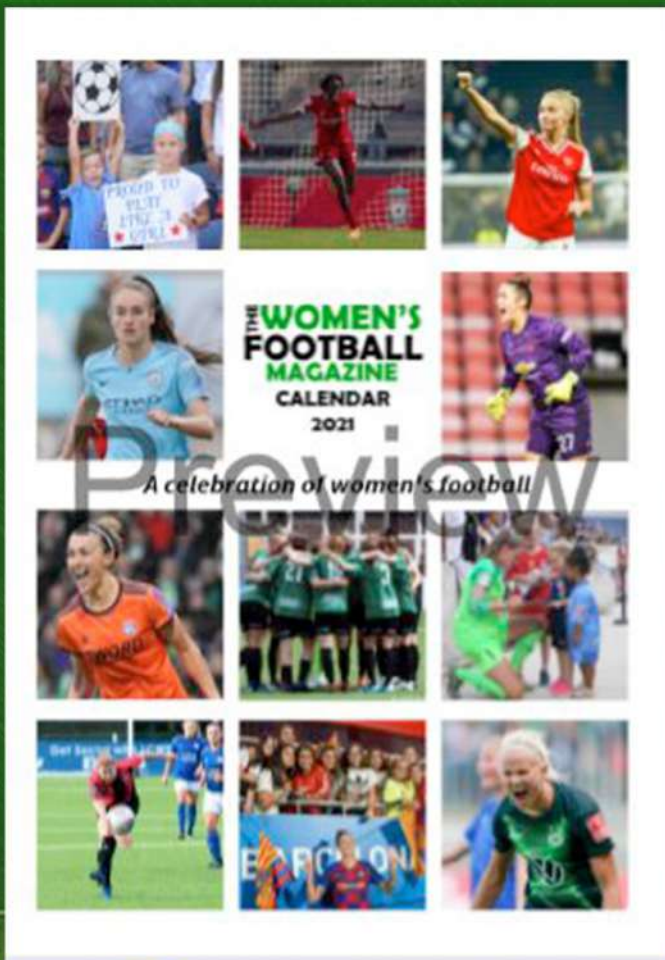

Durham Women sign up for Football Leadership Diversity Code



Durham Women have become one of the first teams in the Women's Championship to sign up to the Football Association's 'Football Leadership Diversity Code'.

The code aims to drive diversity and inclusion across English football, with over 40 clubs across the Premier League, English Football League, WSL and Women's Championship.

The clubs are committed to tackling inequality across senior leadership positions, broader team operations and coaching roles.

The Football Leadership Diversity Code has been developed in collaboration with club executives, players, coaches, HR directors, media and leaders across the game to en-

sure English football better represents our modern and diverse society.

Recognising that clubs and support structures off the pitch do not reflect the increasing gender and ethnic diversity seen on the pitch, it will increase accountability and transparency and will see The FA, key stakeholders and clubs across the men's and women's game commit to embedding greater diversity across senior leadership teams, team operations and coaching setups.

While not mandatory, The FA is encouraging all clubs across the men's and women's games to sign up to the voluntary Code, with a version following the same principles and adapted for the National

League System and grassroots clubs to follow in Spring 2021.

By signing up to the Football Leadership Diversity Code, clubs pledge to create an equality, diversity and inclusion plan which applies hiring targets while adopting specific recruitment principles. The targets, which will become effective immediately, include:

SENIOR LEADERSHIP AND TEAM OPERATIONS

15% of new hires will be Black, Asian or of Mixed-Heritage [or a target set by the club based on local demographics]

30% of new hires will be female

COACHING: MEN'S PROFESSIONAL CLUBS

25% of new hires will be Black, Asian or of Mixed-Heritage

10% of new senior coaching hires will be Black, Asian or of Mixed-Heritage

COACHING: WOMEN'S PROFESSIONAL CLUBS

50% of new hires will be female

15% of new hires will be Black, Asian or of Mixed-Heritage

RECRUITMENT

Shortlists for interview will have at least one male and one female Black, Asian or of Mixed-Heritage candidate, if applicants meeting the job specifications apply.

Mark Bullingham, The FA's Chief Executive Officer, said: "I would like to thank the players, coaches, HR Directors, media and league and club officials from across football who have contributed to the development of the Code.

"Together we have created commitments that will drive real change across the game.

"The Code will hold clubs, leagues and our own organisation to account and ensure opportunities for everyone to work at all levels in football.

"We remain deeply committed to doing everything we can to address inequality in all its forms and to deliver a game free from discrimination. Today is a really positive step forward."

Simon Says

This month, I have interviewed match official Julia Kings, here's what she had to say...

When did you first become involved in football?

I first became involved in football at primary school when they held a session for girls. Then, Aston Villa started doing some training session with us, which led me to join a football team. My dad who is also a referee has been involved in football my whole life.

At what age did you begin playing football?

I started playing football at 8 years old for Birch Coppice and then at 11/12, I joined a girl's team called Lichfield Diamonds LFC who I played for the majority of my time before joining university where I still play.

How old were you when you became interested in being a match official?

I decided that I wanted to become a referee at the age of 12/13 when helping at one of my dad's matches.

After your interest, how did you become a match official?

I took a course as soon as I was able to after I turned 14 and completed the full

course, not the women's only as I don't think that was an option when I did it.

Which league did you begin officiating in?

When I first started, I was officiating in my local junior and didn't really referee former teammates until I started officiating older age groups.

What year did you finish your course?

I completed my course in 2014 and am now in my 7th season of officiating.

Moving through the levels can be a long process. How have you found the process?

The process of moving through the levels has been all right, I am currently a level 6 going for 5, with the only slight issue being getting observed with games as I swap between being at university and at home. However, usually, it works out that I get observed whenever I am back from university.

Did you continue to play football?

Yes, I still play football and have training for that twice a week as well as a match which helps to keep my fitness up. I also go on a few runs a week which helps with both playing and officiating.

Simon Says

What leagues do you officiate in? I don't know the specific levels of the leagues I am officiating in but the highest ones are probably the Midland Football League and the Nottinghamshire Senior League.

Since beginning have you experienced any issues with being a female match official?

Personally, I haven't really experienced any issues with being a female official, some people just seem shocked to start with that I am officiating an open age game.

What improvements would you like to see in the coming years?

Over the next 5/10 years, I would like to see more women involved in the game both the male side and female side as I think the fa are trying to encourage women into the game. Hopefully, I can continue progressing and be officiating at a higher level.

In the time you have been officiating what has been your highlight?

I would say the highlight of my officiating career so far has to be either being an assistant in the early rounds of the day cup round or an assistant for the u16 girl's county cup final two years running.

How have you found it combining university with being a match official?

I am currently in my third year and so far, have found it ok to balance my workload and my match official role as well as playing myself. I will always put the uni work first so if I have a deadline, I might not officiate that weekend for example.

Any long term career aims as a match official?

My current aim is to keep progressing through the levels and leagues as a referee, whether that be in the men's game or the women's.

Can you offer advice for any girls looking to get involved as a match official?

Personally, I would tell any girls who are thinking of being a match official to go for it and to not be afraid of doing it. I think with me I lack confidence, but you've just got to go for and you will progress and get better. As someone who has always loved football becoming an official gave me a different view on the whole game and I don't regret it at all.

The FA's new four-year strategy, titled Inspiring Positive Change, pledges to create a sustainable future for women's and girls' football in England.

The strategy outlines The FA's EIGHT transformational objectives to be achieved by 2024.

- **EARLY PARTICIPATION:**

Every primary school-aged girl to have equal access to football in school and in clubs

- **DEVELOPMENT PARTICIPATION:**

Every girl to have equal access to participate

for fun, for competition and for excellence

- **CLUB PLAYER PATHWAY:**

Collaborate with clubs to develop an effective high performance, inclusive player-centred pathway

- **ELITE DOMESTIC LEAGUES AND COMPETITIONS:**

Create the best professional women's sports leagues and competitions in the world

- **ENGLAND:**

Win a major tournament

- **FOOTBALL FOR ALL**

Recruit and support a motivated, diverse range of local leaders organising football for their communities

- **COACHING:**

Support the development of exceptional coaches at every level of the game who are representative of our society

- **REFEREEING:**

Ensure that every female referee afforded high-quality bespoke learning and development opportunities from grassroots through to the elite game

The strategy will see football embedded for girls in schools, as part of the PE curriculum and in afterschool sessions, setting the target that 90% of schools [both primary and secondary] in England to become part of The FA Girls' Football School Partnerships network, supported by Barclays. Away from school, it pledges to provide every girl with a Wildcats programme within easy travelling distance of their home.

Working alongside national partners, specialist community groups, and national inclusion advisory groups such as The FA Asian Women in Football Advisory Group and The FA Refugees and AsylumSeekers in Football network, the strategy will identify, develop and support female leaders from diverse communities.

Crucial to the vision of more England-qualified players and world-class players within our system, will be a well-signposted, inclusive and accessible club player pathway. Supporting the recruitment, development and transition of players, the pathway will also consider their needs from tactical, technical, psychological, physiological, social and dual-career perspective.

Attracting and developing world-class players, maximising and engaging audiences and growing commercial revenue will be central to the ambition of establishing England as the home of the world's best professional women's sports leagues and competitions.

Success with the national teams is underpinned by the new England women's 'Blueprint for Success', creating an environment for all England-qualified talent

to pursue and fulfil their dreams at the UEFA Women's EURO Championships 2022 and the FIFA Women's World Cup 2023.

The strategy also commits formal learning opportunities for every coach at all levels of the game and the establishment of a sustainable refereeing recruitment strategy embedded into local communities, clubs and Higher Education and Further Education establishments.

Integrated marketing, commercial and communications support across all levels will play a critical role in delivering the strategy, supporting the 'if you can't see her, you can't be her' approach.

The home UEFA Women's EURO Championships in 2022 will be a catalyst for growth across every area.

The strategy will be delivered in partnership with other football stakeholders and The FA's commercial partners.



Baroness Sue Campbell, The Director of Women's Football at The FA said: "Football has the power to change lives for the better.

"It can contribute to physical and mental wellbeing, it can provide opportunities to compete and collaborate with others, and it can help to shape the place of girls and women in wider society.

"Our new four-year strategy is based on understanding an individual's motivation to play – for learning, for recreation, for competition and for excellence.

"We want to ensure there is access and opportunity for every girl and woman to play, coach, spectate, officiate, manage or administer if they so wish and the game to be truly representative of our society across all characteristics and social backgrounds.

"The FA's new Inspiring Positive Change strategy will build upon the foundations

created by The Gameplan for Growth and deliver truly transformational change to the women's and girls' game."

Steph Houghton, England Women's captain said: "When I and many of my teammates were girls, opportunities to play the game were few and far between, so to see the breadth and scale of The FA's ambitions in the next four years is extremely exciting.

"From the incredible pledge to provide equal access to football for primary-aged girls, to the pathway created for the country's best talent to fulfil their potential – this strategy is truly game-changing.

"This new strategy will help provide opportunities for women and girls of all ages, abilities and backgrounds to fall in love with football and enjoy the many benefits that it can bring to their life."

Everton 1-3 Manchester City:

City retain title in extra time

Two goals in extra time from Manchester City secured them a second consecutive Women's FA Cup trophy.

The game, played at an empty Wembley, concluded the competition which was due to finish at the beginning of May but was postponed due to the Covid-19 lockdown.

The contest was the closest-fought final since the fixture was moved to Wembley in 2015.

United States midfielder Sam Mewis, who was easily the best player on the pitch in the first half, nodded an Alex Greenwood corner in shortly before half time.

France's Valerie Gauvin took a heavy knock just before half time, with many expecting her to be substituted during the break.

However, she came back out to head Everton level from Izzy Christiansen's corner in the second half.

Gareth Taylor's side could have settled the game early in the second 45 as Caroline Weir hit the post twice and then captain Steph Houghton saw her chance tipped onto the bar

by Everton's Sandy MacIver.

The 22-year-old Lioness gave a number of superb saves to keep the Toffees' in the game.

Unbeaten in their first five games of that new WSL season, the Toffees arrived at Wembley in fine form, but it was still last season's WSL runners-up City who were considered the pre-match favourites and they lived up to that tag with a strong opening 45 minutes.

But Everton, appearing in their first final since 2014 and trying to win their first cup since 2010, battled back strongly and the game was almost end-to-end at times in the final 20 minutes of normal time, before holders City edged clear in the latter stage of extra time to win the cup for the third time in four seasons.

In the second half of extra-time Georgia Stanway put City in front again before Janine Beckie settled the game with just minutes to go.

The win is Manchester City's third FA Cup title and a first trophy for Taylor, who took over from Nick Cushing when he left for the USA.

"It means everything," he told mancify.com. "It's a mix of emotions at the moment. It's not sunk in my I am really proud.

"I am fresh to this – I have not even hit double figures for games under my belt. I have been blown away by the support of the girls and their effort and application.

"(After the game), I spoke to my family. I was on the phone to my mum. I think she had been though the ringer more than I have!

"She said when she used to watch me play, she was just focused on me but she was focused on everything. It's different.

"It was nice to share that moment on the pitch and take it all in. Sometimes, you have to savour the moment – it's something to be really proud of.

Ellen White has praised the competition in the England squad after a host of new faces were called up for both of the Lionesses' September and October camps.

The Manchester City striker was one of 15 members of England's 2019 World Cup squad selected ahead of the Lionesses' friendly with Germany - which was subsequently cancelled due to coronavirus - while seven uncapped players were also included.

The 28-person squad was packed full of up and coming talent as England look to build for the future, and White explained that the experienced members of the team are learning just as much from the youngsters as the youngsters are from them.

"They don't ask me anything!" White joked when questioned about any pearls of wisdom she was being asked to pass on to the new squad members.

"They're always wanting to learn, to be competitive, to be better and better.

"For us more experienced players, we like being driven, we want to learn, we want to develop as well so they're always pushing us to get better and better as well as us pushing them, because ultimately that's going to make our team better.

"I love learning off the younger players coming through; they're pushing me. It is really exciting that we've got so many youngsters coming through that are so talented, and also that are great people as well, which is a key factor in an England team but also in a winning culture.

“*Everyone's shirt is up for grabs*”

"Everyone's shirt is up for grabs and that's what makes it exciting. In every training session I'm flying around!"

The next 11 months are seen as a transitional period for England, with Phil Neville currently still in charge before Sarina Wiegman takes the reins in September 2021.

Neville's injection of youth and fresh faces is all part of the transitional process - and for captain Steph Houghton, it's another reminder of the talent at England's disposal.

"I've been through a few transitional periods within the England team!" Laughed Houghton.

"I think it's really refreshing. These new players that have come in have thoroughly deserved coming into this squad with their performances at club level.

"We're able to give these youngsters a lot of chances because of the quality of players we have. For us as an England setup it's great to have

such a range of players, but also players that are really playing well and are in good form, and it makes training that bit more competitive.”

The latest England camp came in the wake of the FA launching their new four-year strategy titled Inspiring Positive Change.

The strategy sees English football’s governing body targeting a major trophy win by 2024 - a challenge that the squad do not see as expected, not a daunting ask.

“All the tournaments we’ve been involved in, as players we put that expectation on ourselves,” said Houghton.

“We go into a major tournament and we want to win.

“The pressure we put on ourselves is probably more than the pressure you guys (the media) put on us or anybody else within the FA. For me obviously the aim is to win a major tournament.”

“We want to win every game,” added White. “Whatever tournament we’ve been involved in we’ve wanted to win, and it’s great that we want to win a World Cup - we wanted to win in 2019.

“We’ve got a Team GB Olympics coming up, we’ve also got a Euros so there’s massive tournaments before that World Cup to potentially win something. It’s great we want to invest and put money into hopefully building a massive legacy and hopefully winning a World Cup.”

Having fallen at the semi final stage in each of the last three major tournaments, just how do the Lionesses get over the final hurdle and get their hands on their first piece of silverware?

“Probably if they took VAR out of a tournament that would be nice!” White joked. “It’s fine margins, that ability to push that one or two percent.

“We’re all working as hard as we can individually to make the team even better and hopefully when we do come to those moments again we will have that extra one or two percent to push over the line, get to that final and win a major tournament.”





England to receive pay despite Germany cancellation



England Women are still to be paid for the cancelled friendly against Germany.

The game, which was due to be played on October 27, was cancelled just two days before.

The FA statement read: “England Women have taken the difficult decision today to cancel the squad’s away fixture against Germany, scheduled to take place on Tuesday 27 October.

“This follows the return of a positive COVID-19 test result for a member of the Lionesses’ backroom staff and our consequent concern for the safety and welfare of all players and staff which remains our top priority.

“The current COVID-19 protocol enforced

by the German government requires that any individual who tests positive whilst in the country must self-isolate for 14 days. We cannot take the risk that this may happen to a player or member of England staff.

“The FA’s chief executive Mark Bullingham said: “This has been a difficult but necessary decision.

“Nothing is more important than the safety, health and wellbeing of the players and colleagues under our care.

“We are very grateful to the DFB for their cooperation and understanding and look forward to the possibility of a future fixture in healthier and safer times.”

“England head coach Phil Neville said: “While we all wanted to play Tuesday’s game, this was absolutely the right course of action.

“I thank Germany’s staff for their understanding and our FA colleagues for their support.

“I know the fans were hoping to see us play again but I am sure they will understand the decision.

“We have still had a good week of training and are looking forward to getting together next month before our match against Norway in Sheffield.”

“The remainder of England Women’s October camp at St. George’s Park was cancelled and the players will return to their clubs today.”

The Athletic was told that each player would receive their normal match fee despite the cancellation.

After the FA agreed to pay men and women equally, it is understood to be £1000 per game.

The decision was made because the travelling squad were ready to play before the decision was made.



Beverly Priestman appointed head coach of Canadian Women



The head coach of England Women's Under-18s and former Senior Women's assistant coach, Beverly Priestman, has today been appointed as the new head coach of Canada Women.

Priestman, who helped Phil Neville guide the Lionesses to the semi-final of the FIFA Women's World Cup in 2019, will assume her new role on 1 November.

Priestman is well known to Canadian football fans having served as John Herdman's assistant coach, most notably at the FIFA Women's World Cup 2015 and the 2016 Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro where Canada achieved bronze.

Priestman was also National Youth Head Coach and Program Director, before she returned to England to rejoin The FA in 2018.

Speaking of her new role, Priestman said: "I've thoroughly enjoyed my time at The FA, particularly working closely with Phil Neville and the senior squad during an exciting two years which saw us reach the semi-finals of the Women's World Cup.

England Women's physical performance manager Dawn Scott embarks on elite sporting director qualification



Dawn Scott has gone back to the classroom part-time to study for Manchester Metropolitan's Masters of Sport Directorship (MSD) qualification.

The sport scientist played a major role in the US's back-to-back Women's World Cup wins and was appointed physical performance coach for the senior England women's team in November last year

Scott, who was appointed by the FA to lead the delivery of "game-changing physical performance service" to Phil Neville's Lionesses, has embarked on the renowned MSD, which she will study as part of a cohort of 25 other sports professionals over the next two years.

England cricket director Ashley Giles was among the first students to graduate from the course in 2017 and has credited his studies at Manchester Metropolitan University with helping to shape the way he carries out his role for the ECB.

England and Manchester City goalkeeper Karen Bardsley, who was earlier this year appointed by the FA as an independent non-executive director of women and girls' football in Manchester, is also an MSD graduate, as is Sheffield Wednesday's head of sport science and medicine Tony Strudwick, while Manchester City's sport science head Sam Erith is due to graduate next summer.

Dawn Scott said: "I'm passionate about women's sport and have been a practitioner in the women's game for over 20 years now. I am always looking to grow and develop personally and professionally, especially to gain more impact as a leader, and longer term want to transition to a more strategic role.

“The MSD was really appealing as it covers so many topics that I want to learn more about and apply to my current role, as well as use to shape my future career ambitions.”

Mark Batey, who heads the MSD at Manchester Metropolitan University, said: “The MSD is now in its seventh year and over that time it has without doubt become recognised as the go-to course for sports industry professionals who want to equip themselves with the skills and knowledge that are needed for the strategic, top-level roles such as sporting director.

Scotland suffered their first defeat in the European Championship qualifiers against Group E leaders Finland.

Finland, who are now four points ahead in the group table, secured the win with a Eveliina Summanen goal in the second half.

Scotland started stronger with Erin Cuthbert firing a loose ball towards goal but it was saved by goalkeeper Tinja-Riikka Korpela.

Caroline Weir then sent Thomas through but the West Ham forward shot wide.

Finland had the attacking impetus early in the second period with Franssi's shot from 20 yards tipped over by Alexander.

But from the corner, Natalia Kuikka's header was cleared off the line by Lizzie Arnot and Summanen buried the rebound - the first goal Scotland have conceded in four Group E matches.

Speaking after the game, Shelley Kerr said: "It's frustrating we've come away with nothing after putting in all the plans to get the win.

"Credit to Finland who hurt us on the second phase of a set play which normally we would deal with.

"There wasn't a lot in the game. We controlled more of the game than they did but at the end of the day they've got the three points.

"We're disappointed but we know what's at stake and what we've got to do now. We've got to beat a good Portugal team away from home and then beat Finland at home.

"We've dropped three points and Finland and Portugal have dropped two so far. Nothing changes for us.

"It's good that we have two games next month. Hopefully we get some of our players back and we're in a strong position to get two good results."

Kerr's team, who have a game in hand, visit Portugal late next month before welcoming Finland to Edinburgh on 1 December. The final two qualifiers with Cyprus (away) and Portugal (home) will take place in February.

Wales hopes of reaching a first major finals suffered a blow with another 1-0 defeat to Norway.

It was moments later that Wales were finally breached and they'll be disappointed to have contributed to their own downfall with Kayleigh Green overrunning the ball and Hughes unable to make the interception as Thorsnes shielded the ball and Maanum fired home from 20-yards.

Blakstad fired wide as Norway looked to make the game safe, but Wales finished strongly with chances of their own as they pushed and pushed to equalise.

Fishlock came closest, firing just wide through a crowded box while Wales saw two penalty appeals waved away by referee Irina Mirt.

"If I'm honest I am probably more angry than anything else," Ludlow told BBC Sport Wales after the match.

"I am angry about the goal in the sense that it is a switch-off moment from us.

"Obviously we had a game plan to try and nullify them and we were doing it pretty well. I am sure it wasn't a great spectacle to watch for 60 minutes, but it was playing into our hands.

This comes despite having to play over an hour of the game with 10 players.

Shiels changed the shape of his team at the break, introducing Linfield Ladies teenage defender Abbie Magee for her debut and dropping the outstanding Sarah McFadden into the heart of the defence after Ashley Hutton had to be replaced.

Goalkeeper Jacqueline Burns was sent off in the 27th minute for bringing down Anastasya Shcherbachenia.

Three minutes before half-time Rachel Furness headed in the winner at the back post from Demi Vance's corner.

“They showed Northern Ireland spirit tonight, they dug in — and remember it was 0-0 when we had Jackie sent off,” said Shiels.

“We won the last hour 1-0 with a player less, so that was testament to the work that they have put in and training really, really hard to get into this position.”

The win sees Northern Ireland move up to third in Group C, two points clear of Belarus.

Former world champions Norway have qualified with six wins from six but second-placed Wales are three points ahead of Northern Ireland, having played one game more.

The nine group winners, plus the three runners-up with the best records will automatically qualify for the tournament in England in 2022, while the other six runners-up will play off for the remaining berths in the 16-team finals.

Germany, Belgium & Netherlands to bid for 2027 WWC



Germany, the Netherlands and Belgium have announced a joint bid to host the 2027 Women's World Cup.

The three countries' football associations said they had presented plans to Fifa and will draft further details in the upcoming months.

Last Year Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Iceland and the Faroe Islands said they were working on a joint bid.

Germany hosted the Women's World Cup in 2011, while the Netherlands staged the Women's Euro 2017 championship. Belgium has never held a major women's

tournament.

"Women's football in our countries is indeed in differing phases of development, but we share the aspiration to give the sport a boost nationally and globally by organising this World Cup," said the three countries in a joint statement.

The 2023 edition will be held in Australia and New Zealand.

England will host the next European Championships in 2022.

The tournament was due to be played in 2021 but has been delayed by the coronavirus pandemic.

"They arrived in Tallinn on another charter flight on October 24 where they were tested again," Mihkel Uiboleht, head of PR for the Estonian Soccer Association, said in a Health Board press release.

It is currently unsure when the game will now be played.

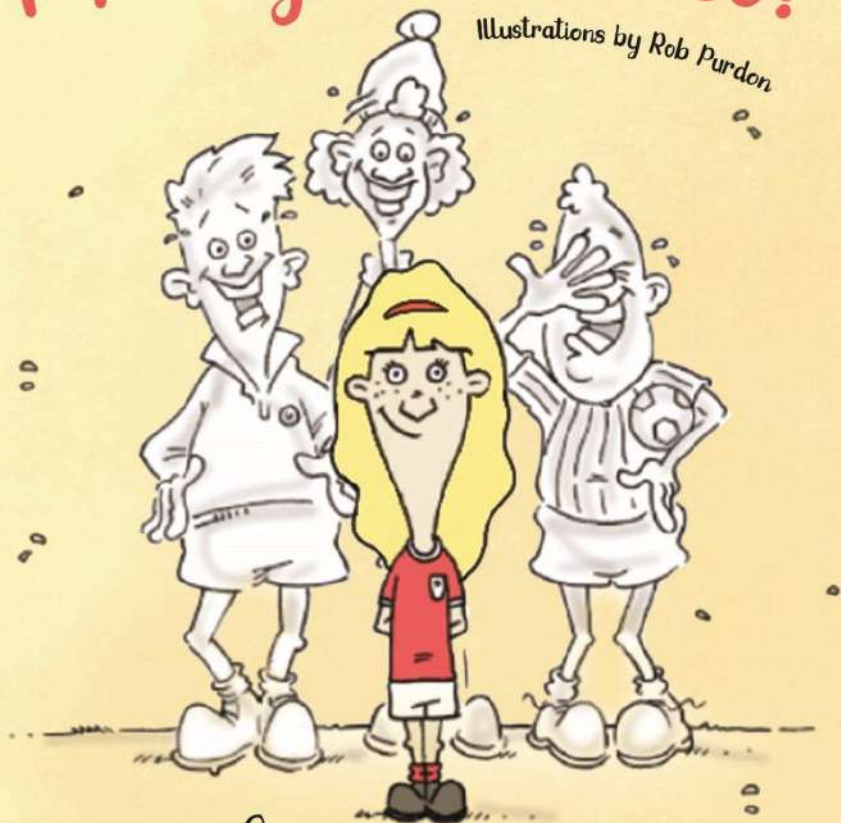
Slovenia currently sit third in Group, with Netherlands and Russia ahead of them on 27 and 18 points respectively.
