Why the WSL title won't be won by Arsenal

Arsenal started their WSL campaign in the best way possible, by beating the reigning champions Chelsea 3-2 at the Emirates. When the two sides face each other in February, Chelsea will be looking to leapfrog their rivals into first spot. Emma Hayes' side are just two points behind Arsenal and they have a game in hand so they are in the driving seat.

While Arsenal have been top of the league for the majority of the season thus far, they have become more unconvincing as the campaign has continued. December was an awful month for the Gunners and instead of returning rejuvenated from the winter break, it was quite the opposite for Arsenal.

An away defeat at Birmingham City who are bottom of the league, highlighted just how poor Arsenal can be when things don't go their way. The Gunners were 2-0 down at half time but showed no signs of recovery in the second half as they succumbed to their only league defeat of the season. Birmingham deserved to win the match but Arsenal can ill afford to lose such games when there is a league title at stake. Chelsea have lost two matches this campaign but they are now out of the Champions League

and will be looking to get over that disappointment by winning the league.

Leah Williamson's hamstring injury in the November North London Derby undoubtedly changed the course of Arsenal's season. Without their crucial ball playing centre back, Arsenal have struggled on numerous occasions and been caught out due to a lack of pace at the back. Williamson also starts attacks and gets Arsenal moving up the pitch, something that has not been replicated in her absence.

The Gunners have dropped vital points in draws against Tottenham Hotspur, Manchester City and Manchester United. However, the promising sign is that they have come from behind in all three of those draws with two of their equalisers coming in the 92nd minute.

There have been times this season when Arsenal look up for the fight but Jonas Eidevall's side are clinging on to top spot by the skin of their teeth and Chelsea are very much waiting in the wings for their opportunity. If Chelsea beat Arsenal when they welcome their rivals to Kingsmeadow, it's hard to imagine the WSL title with anything other than blue ribbons when the season ends.

Skinner named WSL Manager of the Month

Manchester United head coach Marc Skinner was named Women's Super League's manager of the month for January.

The award comes after he was also awarded the win in December.

Skinner beat Manchester City's Gareth Taylor and Reading's Kelly Chambers.

He told the official website: "It feels amazing. When we won the first one last month, it was amazing, but I have to credit the staff, the players - you can't win this unless it's for them and with them.

"More importantly, our energy is from the fans. As a collective, we all take this award and it can be a cliché when you just talk about it being everyone, but it really is everyone.

"I just take a percentage of this and everyone should share in it.

"I think what it shows is a credit to the players and the growth that we've had. It's never easy to keep clean sheets in this league and we know that," Marc explains.

"But it's something we focus on as a group and the players have shown their absolute quality and commitment to everything we're doing.

"More importantly, it's shown the quality of play that we've produced in the month, but we have to continue to do that."



Poppy Soper joins Chelsea

Chelsea have agreed a dual registration for goalkeeper Poppy Soper.

The dual registration is with Plymouth Argyle for the 19-year-old.

The Welsh senior international has been at Argyle for the past two seasons.

She will now train alongside Ann-Katrin Berger and Zecira Musovic at Cobham to further her development.

She will be available for selection with both teams.

Dowie wins January Goal of the Month

Reading's Natasha Dowie has won the Women's Super League January goal of the month award.

It was Dowie's curtain-raiser in 2022 against Leicester at the Select Car Leasing Stadium which grabbed the headlines and the award.

Having been played down the left by Vanhaevermaet, Dowie had the time to settle herself before producing an audacious lob from 25 yards out to catch the Foxes' keeper off her line.

On the award, the Royals forward told the official website: "I'm really happy with the award. The finish really pleased me, on my weaker foot as well, but most importantly it was crucial in getting the three points for the team. I'd like to thank all the people that did vote for me, I'm so happy here at Reading we're in great form, and individually it's nice to win these awards.

"Despite this being an individual award, for me, it goes to my teammates too.

"I wouldn't be able to score the chances with my team giving me the chances, and they're making it easy for me at the moment."

Villa midfielder signs contract extension

Aston Villa have announced that Laura Blindkilde Brown has signed a contract extension until 2025.

Blindkilde Brown penned a first professional contract in September having made 24 goal contributions for our WSL Academy during the 2020/21 season.

The midfielder has since made nine first-team appearances in all competitions and netted her first senior goal against Sunderland in December.

Roman Abramovich:

What does it mean for Chelsea Women

As the war in Ukraine rages on, the pain and concern continues to resonate around the world.

On Thursday, March 10, Chelsea owner Roman Abramovich, had his assets frozen as part of a range of British government sanctions against even Russian “pro-Kremlin” oligarchs closely linked with Vladimir Putin’s regime.

It means Abramovich can no longer sell Chelsea or make money from owning them.

It also means that the club are now under strict rules on what they can and cannot do and it is a criminal offence if they do not comply.

So what does this mean for Emma Hayes’ side?

What are Chelsea banned from doing?

- Only season ticket holders and those who have already bought tickets will be allowed to attend Chelsea games.
- The club are no longer permitted to transfer or loan players.
- Broadcast and prize money is frozen
- The official club shop has been forced to close
- The club is allowed to continue to play fixtures and has been permitted “reasonable travel costs” with a maximum per game of £20,000
- Fans at games are still allowed to purchase food and drink

What does it mean for Chelsea’s sponsors?

Three, the British telecoms company, is the team’s principal shirt sponsor—for both the women’s and men’s teams.

The deal is believed to be worth around £40m a year but the company have confirmed they are suspending their partnership with the club.

A spokesperson said: “In light of the government’s recently announced sanctions, we have requested Chelsea Football Club temporarily suspend our sponsorship of the club, including the removal of our brand from shirts and around the stadium until further notice.

“We recognise that this decision will impact the many Chelsea fans who follow their team passionately. However, we feel that given the circumstances, and the government sanction that is in

place, it is the right thing to do. As a mobile network, the best way we can support the people of Ukraine is to ensure refugees arriving in the UK from the conflict and customers currently in Ukraine can stay connected to the people who matter to them. Therefore, we are offering connectivity packages to all Ukrainians arriving in the UK, and those in Ukraine.”

Hyundai, Chelsea shirt sleeve sponsor, have also followed suit but Nike and training kit sponsor Trivago have decided to remain with the European champions.

Why are Chelsea players still wearing the Three logo on shirts?

Three asked Chelsea to immediately remove the logo from their shirts but the players from both teams were seen wearing them for their Premier League and Women's Super League fixtures.

It has been reported that Chelsea remain in discussions with Three and could be struggling to purchase new kits due to the impact of the sanction, which included the club's credit cards from being

frozen by Barclays.

What does this mean for the players?

Chelsea will continue to pay the wages of all employees including players and coaches of both the men's and women's teams.

Emma Hayes' side will be unable to sign any potential targets and they cannot offer contract extensions for current players, which could have a huge impact if the sanctions continue long-term.

As it stands, four women's players will be out of contract this summer.

Jonna Andersson, Maren Mjelde, Ji So-yun, and Drew Spence all have just months left on their current deals and are unable to extend their commitment to the club.

Unless sanctions are lifted before the summer transfer window, the quartet will be made free agents. Chelsea will also be unable to make any new signings once the window opens.

Has Emma Hayes said anything about the news?

It has long been known that Hayes has been close to the Chelsea owner.

Abramovich has shown a keen interest in the women's side, commiserating their Champions League defeat in Gothenburg with them and having a private dinner with him in Israel in previous years.

So far Chelsea Women do not wish to make any further comment.

Kelly signs contract extension

Manchester City have announced that Chloe Kelly has signed a three-year contract extension.

The forward has committed herself to the Women's Super League club with a deal which runs to the summer of the 2025.

Kelly moved to the Academy Stadium from Everton in July 2020 and enjoyed a highly successful debut season, scoring 16 goals in 34 appearances and helping City win the delayed 2019-20 Women's FA Cup before an ACL injury brought an unfortunate and premature end to her maiden campaign.

The 24-year-old is yet to feature this term, but is nearing a return to first team action.

Speaking about the new seal, Kelly told mancify.com: "I'm over the moon to finally put pen to paper on a new deal.

"I'm really happy with the way I've started my time here at City, and long may that continue.

"As soon as I came here, I felt so welcomed into the group—the girls are great. I know I've still got so much to learn and the best is yet to come, but I want to win trophies and I believe that we can do that here at City.

"During my rehabilitation, this has been a time where I've learnt so much about myself off the pitch too.

"I've really enjoyed working with Gareth [Taylor] as well – he's really brought out the best in me so far and especially during my first season, he gave me the confidence I needed to thrive as a player."



Gut leaves Arsenal

Malin Gut has left Arsenal after making a permanent move to grasshopper club Zurich.

Gut joined the Gunners in the summer of 2020 and made her debut off the bench in the same year in a 6-1 win over Reading in the Women's Super League.

She made 20 appearances for Arsenal but sustained a serious knee injury in May 2021.

A club statement read: "We would like to thank Malin for her efforts during her time with us and wish her the very best moving forward with her career."



Mead is a new player for club and country this season

In February, England's interim manager Hege Riise left Beth Mead out of her first squad because "the player report hasn't been that great".

Mead's omission was a shock and it was a surprise to hear a manager speak so frankly about a specific player.

Mead was left disappointed once again when she was left out of the Team GB Olympic squad in the summer.

With just 18 players to pick from four countries, this exclusion was perhaps a bit more understandable.

Nonetheless, Mead still took it hard.

Nine months later, Mead is in the form of her life for both club and country.

She has three goals and assists in the Women's Super League (WSL) for Arsenal, just one goal away from last season's tally with five games played.

In 17 games so far this season, Mead has 10 goals and 15 assists.

Proving people wrong is a powerful motivational tool as Mead is showing this term.

In the five-goal thriller against Chelsea in their

WSL season opener, Mead was at the heart of everything good.

She was lively throughout as she put in a complete no 9 performance, scoring twice to delight over 8,000 fans at the Emirates.

Proof of the work Mead had done over the summer was shown in her second goal which was a sensational finish curled into the top corner from the edge of the area with her weaker foot.

Chelsea's goalkeeper Ann-Katrin Berger was so surprised that she told Mead after the match that she didn't know she had a left foot. Mead provided an assist for Vivianne



Miedema in the 5-0 win over Manchester City.

With half over her goal involvement this season coming against Arsenal's title rivals, Mead is showing that she can be hugely influential in the season defining games.

Another explanation for Mead's upturn in form could be the competition for places that was not there last season.

Now Arsenal can call on the likes of fellow England international Nikita Parris, two-time World Cup winner Tobin Heath and Mana Iwabuchi who has also won the World Cup.

Being surrounded by world class players will only improve Mead's quality which will be beneficial for Arsenal and England.

The Lionesses have already seen a huge improvement in Mead this season.

She scored a second-half hat-trick in 14 minutes to break the deadlock against a stubborn Northern Ireland side.

The World Cup qualifier at Wembley finished 4-0 with Mead responsible for 75% of the goals.

Just three days after that superb performance, Mead scored another goal and

provided two assists for Rachel Daly against Latvia.

While it is fair to point that Latvia are bottom of the group with zero points and vastly inferior to England, Mead and the Lionesses were in no mood to go easy on their opponents in the 10-0 win.

One thing is for sure, Beth Mead's player report must look pretty good right now.

Schnaderbeck joins Spurs

Viktoria Schnaderbeck has joined Tottenham Hotspur on loan from Arsenal for the rest of the season.

The defender joined Arsenal in May 2018 and has made a total of 40 appearances to date. In her debut season in the Barclays FA Women's Super League, she helped the Gunners to a league title in 2018/19.

Schnaderbeck told the official website: "I am really looking forward to joining Tottenham Hotspur, the girls have done so well this season.

"I'm excited to help the team as much as I can. I can't wait to get started."

Tottenham head coach Rehanne Skinner added: "Viki is an experienced centre half who brings a lot of value to the team.

"As Austrian national team captain she also brings strong leadership qualities. Viki will help us to establish control both in and out of possession with her ball quality."

The captain of the Austrian team will wear the number 11 shirt.



Old Trafford to hold WSL game

Everton will face Manchester United at Old Trafford in the Women's Super League.

The game, scheduled to be played on Sunday, March 27, has been moved from United's regular home at Leigh Sports Village.

United beat West Ham United at Old Trafford last season, with the game being played behind closed doors due to Covid-19 protocols.

Robinson signs new contract at Brighton

Midfielder Katie Robinson has signed a new contract with Women's Super League side Brighton & Hove Albion.

The deal will see her stay with the club until June 2024 after the 19-year-old joined Hope Powell's side at the beginning of the 2020/21 campaign.

She missed last season with a knee injury but has become a regular squad member and has made ten appearances so far this season.

Robinson will spend the rest of the season on loan with Championship club Charlton.

Head coach Hope Powell told the official website: "We're delighted Katie is committing herself to what we're trying to achieve as a club by signing this contract.

"She recovered well from what was a bad injury last season and she is improving with the more game time and experience she has.

"By going to Charlton she will get regular minutes whilst continuing to train and develop with us.

"We're looking forward to seeing how she progresses."

Chaplen ruled out for the rest of the season

Reading midfielder Brooke Chaplen has been ruled out for the rest of the season.

A statement from the club read: "Royals midfielder Brooke Chaplen will be out indefinitely following recent scan results showing a bone tumour in her right leg.

"Brooke will undergo surgery to have the tumour removed and then begin an extended period of rehabilitation.

"As soon as we know more, we will ensure to update all of our supporters.

"We'd like to wish Brooke all the very best – and she has the full support of the club behind her."

Moore joins Man United



Manchester United have announced the signing of Jade Moore until the 2022/23 season.

The 31-year-old midfielder joins the club having recently spent time with Orlando Pride and Atlético Madrid, after various spells in the WSL throughout her career.

Moore currently has 50 international caps, having made her debut for the senior England team in 2012.

Moore told manutd.com: “I’m delighted to be here at a club like Manchester United; it’s a proud moment after a difficult period for me. It’s great to be back in this league too, I have a lot of experience in the WSL, having played in it for around a decade, and I think I can bring some of that to this team.

“I’m also looking forward to working under Marc again and getting to know my new team-mates, the group here is

thriving and I’m excited to be a part of it.

For me, this was the right move in my career at

this time and I’m going to work as hard as possible to get fit and be in contention.”

Head coach Marc Skinner added: “Jade is a brilliant midfielder, I’ve obviously worked with her in previous roles at Birmingham and Orlando and I know the real qualities she can bring to the squad.

“She is an intelligent player with a great football mind, who has the ability to read and control games.

“She’s been unlucky in the last year with the injury she picked up but we’ve been working with Jade on plans to get her back to full fitness as quickly as possible and we are looking forward to seeing her impact within the squad.”

Galton wins award



Manchester United winger Leah Galton has won the Women's Super League Player of the Month award for January.

The accolade comes off the back of Galton's impressive performances in both league outings during the opening month of the calendar year.

The winger scored three times and provided an assist as the Reds registered a perfect month in the competition, with home wins over Birmingham City and Tottenham Hotspur.

Galton saw off competition from Arsenal's Beth Mead, Birmingham City's Lucy Quinn, Manchester City's Georgia Stanway, Reading's Natasha Dowie and teammate Aoife Mannion.

It's the Red Devils' second player of the month award in a row after Ella Toone won in December.

Speaking to manutd.com, Galton said: "I think I know I needed to pick it up a little bit after a bit of a slow start so I'm just really happy to get under way."

"I think they [the goals] were all quite similar! I'm just happy to get on the scoresheet and assist for the team.

"Consistency is key at the moment and if we keep playing the way we're playing, I'm sure results will come so we just have to keep that mentality."

Roebuck hits City century

Goalkeeper Ellie Roebuck has become the latest Manchester City player to make 100 appearances for the club.

The England shot stopper reached the milestone in their Women's Super League trip to Chelsea – just her third appearance of the 2021/22 season after returning from a calf injury at the end of January.

Since joining City in 2015 as a teenager from childhood club Sheffield United's Centre of Excellence, she made her debut as a substitute in the final league game of our 2016 double-winning season and has helped the Club to three Women's FA Cups and a Continental Cup since.

She signed her first professional deal in January 2018 and extended her stay in February last year.

Stanway becomes City's record women's goalscorer

Georgia Stanway has become Manchester City's new record women's goalscorer.

The 23-year-old leapfrogged Nikita Parris after a hattrick against Nottingham Forest in the Women's FA Cup Fourth Round, increasing her tally to 64 goals.

The forward achieved the feat in 170 appearances, having joined City as a teenager back in 2015.



Bott signs for Leicester

New Zealand international CJ Bott has joined Leicester City on a permanent contract following her spell with Norwegian first division side Vålerenga, subject to league approval.

After signing for the Foxes, she told LCFC TV: "It feels amazing.

"It's been a long road to get here but it's so great to finally be here and get amongst things and meet everyone.

"It's awesome, so I'm happy now."

Bott will wear the number four shirt.



United launch 'Change the Game'

Manchester United have unveiled a new campaign named 'Change the Game'.

The new campaign highlights the club's continued commitment towards leading the way in changing perceptions and attitudes towards the women's game.

A statement from the club said: "‘Change the Game’ will place the women's team at the forefront of change, as the club continues to challenge the stereotypes that exist in football – both on and off the pitch."

The campaign will drive the game forward by maximising opportunities to grow the fan base and inspire the next generation of players and supporters.

The first key moment in the campaign is the Women's Super League match against Everton on March, 27.

It will be held at Old Trafford and tickets are on sale now.

United sign Bruun on loan

Manchester United have signed Signe Bruun on loan until the end of the season.

The 23-year-old striker joins from Olympique Lyonnais and has previously had spells at Paris Saint-Germain and Fortuna Hjørring.

Bruun currently has 19 caps for Denmark and has scored 14 goals for her country. She was also recently voted as Denmark's Player of the Year.

Bruun told the official website: "It's amazing to be here, I'm really happy to be joining Manchester United. It is a big club with huge history, I have followed the women's project for a while and have seen the progression of the team, and I think this move was a perfect match for me.

"I want to be able to help the team as much as possible during my time here, hopefully with a lot of goals but also a lot of hard work too. I can't wait to get started on the training pitch with the players and staff ahead of a busy period of games."

Corsie signs for Aston Villa

Aston Villa have announced the signing of Rachel Corsie on a two-and-a-half year deal.

The central defender joins the club from Kansas City Current in the National Women's Soccer League (NWSL).

Corsie, 32, has had previous spells in England with Notts County and Birmingham City.

Manager Carla Ward told avfc.co.uk: "Rachel is someone I admired greatly while working with her last season.

"When we heard of her availability during this transfer window, we simply couldn't ignore her leadership and overall quality.

"She will guide our young talent and will also give us another dimension at the back. We're delighted to add her to the squad."

New agreement sees players receive changes for the better



The Football Association (The FA) and Professional Footballers Association (PFA) have made a landmark agreement that will see players in the Barclays FA Women's Super League and FA Women's Championship receive enhancements to maternity, injury and illness and termination of contract for long-term injury.

The new agreement will come into effect from the 2022/23 season following consultation with clubs in England's top two divisions of the women's game, with the FA Women's Super League

and FA Women's Championship board ratifying the agreement.

The new maternity policy will form part of a club's licensing agreement, and must be offered to players to ensure license criteria is met. The other uplifts will form part of a revised Standard Contract for Women's Football.

Under the new policy, a player going on maternity leave will be paid 100% of her weekly wage, as well as any other remuneration and benefits for the first 14 weeks, before reverting to applicable statutory rate.

This is a considerable uplift on the current minimum of statutory, and would previously have only applied to players who had been employed by their club from a minimum of 26 weeks. The new policy will have no qualifying period.

As well as maternity cover, the new agreement will also see players receive long-term sickness pay that mirrors the men's game in all new contracts.

Players will now receive their basic wage for the first 18 months if an injury occurs, then one half of their wage for the length of

the injury thereafter. Previously, players received six months' pay.

There will also be more protection for players relating to termination of contract as a result of injury. If a player has been incapacitated for injury or illness for a period of 18 months in a consecutive period of 20 months, a club can be entitled to serve notice, with the length of any notice being 12 months. Prior to this, the notice period was three months.

Kelly Simmons, The FA's Director of the Women's Professional Game, said: "I am delighted that we have been able to put this agreement in place and it is another significant step forward for the women's game.

"Player welfare and wellbeing has always been our number one priority and this new policy ensures players are better supported, whether that's going on maternity leave or as a result of a long-term injury.

"This objective was written into our Women's Pro Game Strategy that we released last year, so I am pleased we have been able to achieve this."



Hinds signs new deal with Liverpool

Liverpool have announced that Taylor Hinds has signed a new long-term contract.

The 22-year-old joined the Reds in the summer of 2020 from Everton and has played a part in every game for the club since.

Hinds earned the honour of wearing the captain's armband for the first time in their 6-0 Vitality Women's FA Cup victory over Lincoln City.

She has also been recognised at international level with recent call-ups for England U23s, scoring twice against Estonia in December.

Manager Matt Beard told the official website: "Taylor has been incredibly consistent throughout the season, both in games and in training. She's just 22 years old and got her just rewards by getting back into the England set-up.

"We're delighted she's committed her future to the club, we see her future as being very bright and we're looking forward to helping her kick on and develop even further."



Miller joins Sheffield United

Sheffield United have announced the signing of Lara Miller.

The former Manchester United and Manchester City youngster became Neil Redfearn's second signing of the January window after getting her first taste of senior football at Lewes during the first half of the season.

Speaking to the official website, she said: "My first impressions have been really positive. I've really enjoyed training with the girls, they've been really welcoming and I've loved the training and the whole environment here.

"The playing standard here is really good. There's so many players here with a lot of experience who I can learn from and take as much from all the players and staff as possible."

London City Lionesses sign Kitching

The London City Lionesses have signed Katie Kitching.

Born in Bedeal, north Yorkshire, Kitching has returned to our shores after playing for the University of South Florida over in the USA.

Starting out at the York Centre of Excellence, Kitching was then picked up by Manchester City, where she was part of their development team playing in the FA WSL reserve league before heading out to the USA.

Studying at the University of South Florida, Kitching went on to join their first team- playing in their attacking midfield.

Speaking to the official website about the new signing, manager Melissa Philips had this to say: “Katie is a gritty attacking player who is versatile to play across multiple positions.

“She’s got a fantastic mindset coupled with her determination to drive at players and create, she will be a real threat going forward.”

Bourne joins Blackburn on loan

Tara Bourne has joined Blackburn Rovers on loan from Women’s Super League side Manchester United.

In her final season with the team, before graduating in 2018, Hopcroft found the net eight times and bagged 15 assists in 28 games.

Hopcroft then joined the Colorado Buffaloes, where she went on to lead the fifth highest scoring attack in the league, bagging 13 goals and 12 assists.

Simon Says

This month I spoke to Blackburn Rovers star Millie Chandarana about her career, how she fell into football and who her favourite players are.

How old were you when you first became interested in football?

I think I was around seven or eight years old and I was playing in PE in my primary school. I then trialled for the boys football team because there was no girls one. After that when I was eight I joined my first girls team in my local area Curzon Ashton.

Many players prefer play in a specific position. When did you choose your playing position?

I've had quite a change over the years with positions... growing up I always played Center back, until I was around 18, I then used to switch sometimes between CB and defensive Center mid. In Italy it changed completely and I played as an attacking Center mid because I was more suited to that role over there.

When did you start to play in organised football teams?

When I was 8 I joined the girls team Curzon Ashton and we competed in the local league and even went to some bigger tournaments, it was pretty cool

Are your family supportive of you

wanting to play football?

Yes they are very supportive, it's been a rollercoaster because women's football, until recently, wasn't sustainable as a full time job, so they were worried what might happen. But they know I will always play as long as I can and they support that.

What was the reaction to your friends when you wanted to play football?

A lot of my friends do play football as well, but I remember in high school, there wasn't many girls playing football, they preferred netball or non-sporting activities. That was quite difficult to get that support, but I was always known as the one who played football

Do you play for the same club now as when you first become interested in football? If not which other teams have you -played for?

I now play for Blackburn Rovers ladies and compete in the championship with them, in the past I was with both Blackburn and Manchester United through their youth academies before playing for Loughborough Foxes and then travelling to Italy to play for UPC Tavagnacco and San Marino Acadmey in the womens Serie A over there.

What is it about being a footballer you like most?

It's a hard question because there's not one thing. If I had to pick one thing I would be actually playing football everyday. There's nothing that can beat it because it's what I've done all my life and now I get to do it almost everyday.

What does a typical week look like as part of a training programme?

We train three evenings and one morning per week and the days we are not team training we are expected to be doing rehab and recovery in preparation for the next training or match, we usually play matches on Sundays but can have some midweek games too.

What has been the most important piece of advice you have been given as a footballer?

I've been given loads of advice but I think I recent one that's stuck with me is that football is all opinions, everyone has their own opinion and sometimes you can't change it, it's just how it is, so always play your game the best you can and your way.

Are you aiming to become a coach after your playing career has

ended?

I've coached a little throughout my career so far but only younger age groups, I don't mind coaching football but I would 100% rather play it. I also prefer coaching 1-1 and small group physical training and mindset development in which I have just started my own business offering to athletes and general population

What advice would you give to any other young girls who want to play football?

I would always say just go out and play, if you want to try it, go and try it, it's a great way to be physically active, mentally stimulated and be able to meet loads of new people all the time.

Finally, if you could pick your best 5 women's players to play alongside who would they be?

Its a tough one, I'll give you a few. I would say, Meghan Rapinoe because she's a great women on and off the pitch too and learning from her would be amazing. I would also say from my time in Italy playing against Vero Boquete and Refiloe Jane was incredible 1, they are quality players.



Gane joins on dual-sign deal

Since that point, Noonan has been undergoing rehabilitation in Ireland while also flying to England for further medical support from the club's multi-disciplinary team.

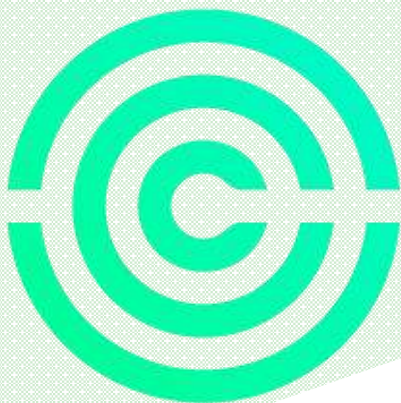
As she continues her return from injury, Noonan will register with Shelbourne in Ireland ahead of returning to Durham for the 2022/23 season.

"It feels great to be back! It's been a crazy few days where everything has happened so fast. But ultimately, it's a great feeling for me and a big honour to be here.

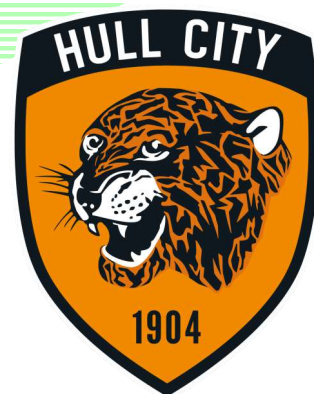

Luton achieve funding goal



Luton Ladies have netted a funding boost from a local power company to help cover the cost of training venues during the winter months.

The football club has received a £250 Team Sport award from UK Power Networks, the company which distributes electricity across the East of England.

The money will go towards securing the use of training facilities for the Eastern Region Premier Division club who have expanded hugely since their formation in 1997.

Employee Jeff Stewart, a field engineer at UK Power Networks, applied for the award as his daughter, Grace, 20, plays for the club's reserve side in the Greater London League, while he helps as a volunteer first aider.

Jeff said: "The women's game has grown significantly in the past decade and it's

been fantastic to support Grace in her own part of that journey.

"I've always been a fan of the Luton Town men's team so when Grace joined up with the youth section of Luton Ladies seven years ago I was more than happy to help out myself as a volunteer.

"This funding will be put towards the cost of hiring winter training facilities which is by far the biggest overhead for the club at this time of year so it's great to receive."

The Team Sport Award scheme encourages UK Power Networks staff to volunteer in the community and is aimed at promoting healthy living, teamwork and developing sporting opportunities.

Hundreds of community and sports groups have benefited from grants since the scheme was set up. During 2021, 77 teams benefitted to a combined sum of £19,250.

Over 90,000 girls take part in FA session



On Wednesday, March 9, over 90,000 girls from schools across England joined in with The FA and Barclays' inaugural Biggest Ever Football Session as part of The FA's Let Girls Play campaign.

Taking place the day after International Women's Day, the nationwide sessions raised awareness of the importance of unlocking equal opportunities for girls to participate in football in schools.

A record 1,450 primary and secondary schools united to take part in the sessions, affirming their commitment to providing girls with equal access to football.

With the support of The FA's delivery partner, Youth Sport Trust, the schools were provided with resources from the England Football Physical Education team to deliver the bespoke sessions throughout the day.

Teachers hosted festivals before school tournaments and joined up with other

Currently, only 63% of schools offer girls' football in PE lessons and only 40% of schools offer girls regular extracurricular football. The FA's ambition, as seen in the Inspiring Positive Change strategy, is to have 75% of schools providing equal access to football for girls in PE lessons and 90% of schools offering regular extracurricular football by 2024.

The Biggest Ever Football Session is part of the Let Girls Play campaign which launched last year to support The FA's strategic ambition for equal access. The campaign is backed by Barclays as part of their record-breaking investment in women and girls' football and commitment to the game. The majority of schools who hosted a session are part of the Barclays Girls' Football School Partnerships, a programme run by Barclays and The FA which aims to influence key decision makers within

schools and support the training of teachers to make this ambition a reality.

The FA's Head of Development Louise Gear, who attended a session at Gorse Hill Primary School in Manchester, said: "To see that over 90,000 girls have taken part in our Let Girls Play Biggest Ever Football Session has filled me with immense pride.

"We launched our strategic ambition and Let Girls Play campaign to raise awareness of the importance of providing girls with equal access to football and seeing so many schools unite on this across the country is fantastic. With it being such a huge year for women's football in this country, more girls than ever will feel inspired to play football and The FA and Barclays want to play an important part in that.

"We want to thank everyone who took part in the day and joined us in our commitment to unlocking equal pathways."

Former England International and Barclays football ambassador Kelly Smith, MBE, who attended a session at Oakington Primary School in London, added: "It was a privilege to visit Oakington Primary School and see the Let Girls Play campaign in action.

"Seeing so many girls unite to celebrate their love of the game and desire to play football was really special. There were nearly 200 girls taking part at this school which was amazing. Moments like this make me extremely proud to be part of such an important campaign and event that The FA and Barclays have created."

Lisa Bates head teacher at Gorse Hill Primary School, one of the schools taking part in the campaign, added: "We're so thrilled to have taken part in the Let Girls Play Biggest Ever Football Session and do our part for providing girls with equal access to football in schools. The girls were so excited to be part of the session and knowing thousands of other girls were doing the same across the country made it even more special. We've seen first hand the benefits of children playing football from an early age, not just physically, but mentally too so it was important for us to be part of this momentous occasion."

Manchester City manager Gareth Taylor to BBC Two:

"I'm really proud of the players, I thought we were immense second half.

"We knew we weren't great first half and we spoke about belief and faith at half-time and I don't think the players could have shown any more of that in the second half and we were deserved winners.

"We were fully deserved winners of the competition. Everyone has been magnificent and they deserve this."

On match-winner Caroline Weir: "She scores important goals but she realises the importance of the team and the second half was all about that.

"This gives us massive belief going forward – Chelsea are a very good team they have the edge against us, it's the first time we have scored against them this season and you have to say we could have scored more."

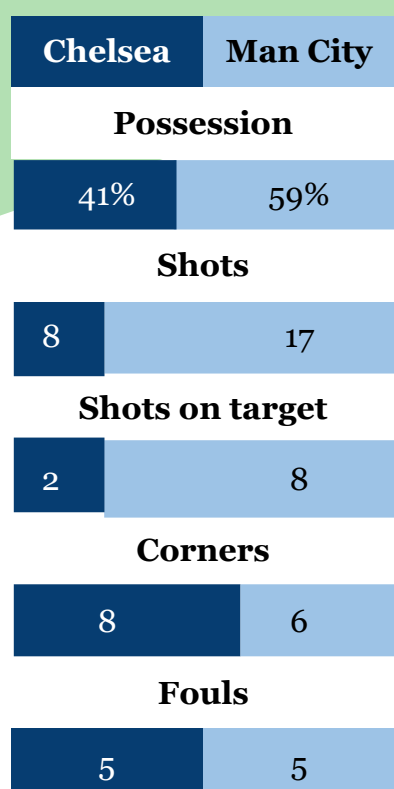
Speaking to BBC Two, Chelsea manager Emma Hayes said: "First half we did enough without having control of the ball. That is what let us down today, we didn't keep the ball well enough. When it be-

Vitality Women's FA Cup prize fund increases



The Football Association has today announced a new landmark investment into the Vitality Women's FA Cup that will see the competition's prize fund receive a significant uplift to £3m per year.

The new agreement will be introduced from the start of the 2022/23 season and will see funds spread across each round of the competition, resulting in greater investment across both the women's

professional and grassroots game.

The FA Board signed off on the new proposals at a meeting last Thursday, highlighting The FA's commitment in continuing the impressive growth of the women's football – across every level of the game.

The Vitality Women's FA Cup has grown in stature, with 417 teams entering the competition this season, while

interest has significantly increased over the last decade, which resulted in the Final being permanently moved to Wembley Stadium connected by EE in 2015.

This new financial commitment from The FA looks to recognise and acknowledge that increased profile and commercial interest in the competition.

Now that the uplift in prize fund for the Vitality Women's FA Cup has been agreed,

work will begin on how that money is divided and allocated, with the aim being for all clubs that enter the competition to benefit.

One commitment that The FA will be making, is that a disproportionate amount of this new fund will be invested into the early rounds of the competition. This will ensure those clubs further down the pyramid entering those rounds, really feel the benefit of the prize money earned.

Sue Campbell, Director of Women's Football at The Football Association, said: "I'm delighted to be able to make this announcement of increased funding for the

Vitality Women's FA Cup because it's going to benefit so many clubs across the women's football pyramid.

"The FA Cup, whether men's or women's, is the biggest and best domestic cup competition in the world, and this increased investment from The FA highlights that we want clubs competing in it to be rewarded, while also highlighting our ongoing commitment to the women's game.

"Women's football continues to be in a growth phase and we are always looking to make improvements and investment to drive it forward and break new boundaries. This is certainly one of the most

pleasing during my time with the organisation, because I know it means so much to so many."

More details will be announced in due course on the structure of the new funding and how it will be distributed across the different stages of the Vitality Women's FA Cup next season.

England's friendlies confirmed in preparation for Euro22



England's final preparations before UEFA Women's EURO 2022 will include two home internationals against fellow tournament contenders in June.

England, unbeaten in nine matches under Sarina Wiegman, will take on Belgium at Wolverhampton Wanderers' Molineux Stadium - scene of last month's Arnold Clark

Cup triumph - on Thursday 16 June. The Lionesses will then welcome the Netherlands, the reigning European champions, to Leeds United's Elland Road on Friday 24 June. Both matches are set to kick off at 8pm.

An overseas fixture against opposition to be confirmed will then be played before Wiegman's squad return to England to begin the last preparations for the opening match of the UEFA European Championship against Austria at Old Trafford, Manchester on Wednesday 6 July.

Wiegman said: "Although at the moment we are fully focused on the two upcoming April qualifiers, with the Euros approaching you also feel the excitement growing.

"These matches against Belgium and the Netherlands will be just the challenge we need in the last weeks of our work to be ready for the EUROS.

"I hope we can continue the progress we have shown so far and build on the strong team spirit and togetherness that we will need to have in the final tournament.

"And of course playing Netherlands, and seeing so many familiar faces again who Arjan and I have worked with for many years gives a special touch to a game against good opposition.

"I am excited to be going back to Wolverhampton. We were given a tremendous welcome against Germany. I am also very pleased to have the match in Leeds. I know it is an area that has a big passion for football and I hope we can give the fans plenty of excitement at both matches."

England have also confirmed the Lionesses will be based at the national football centre St. George's Park in Staffordshire in the build-up to the two warm-up fixtures and the opening match of the EURO.

The June warm-up fixtures will follow two 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup qualifiers away to North Macedonia and Northern Ireland on 8 and 12 April respectively with the Lionesses top of qualifying Group D on the road to Australia and New Zealand.

England's year began in February with 1-1 and 0-0 draws against Canada and Spain in turn before a 3-1 defeat of Germany at Molineux ensured the Lionesses were winners of the inaugural Arnold Clark Cup.

The Walsh-Williamson Pivot: Can It Work?

Over the past couple of years, under Phil Neville and Hege Riise, England have typically played with a 4-3-3 formation. This was usually reinforced with a rather bland game-plan and a chronically predictable line-up. Unsurprisingly, no matter how many times the system was used, it never quite worked.

The term 'plateau' would be reasonable to use. No visible improvement was seen since the semi-final of the 2019 World Cup. At first it was understandable but a hangover can only last for so long. Since then, many of the Lionesses' disappointing results have been pinned on defensive fragilities. Whilst it is fair to argue there certainly have been occasions in which England were defensively poor, the fact they struggled to make very

little impact through the middle and final thirds points to problems further up the pitch.

England's midfield has been a sticking point in their development. As aforementioned, England typically played using a 4-3-3 formation, yet lacked the personnel in midfield to successfully pull it off. The Lionesses used this system to field one defensive midfielder and two attacking ones. But looking at England's midfielders there is a clear imbalance that has led to a disconnect between attack and defence.

Of their options, Keira Walsh is England's only 'trade' defensive midfielder whereas Georgia Stanway, Ella Toone, Jordan Nobbs and Fran Kirby are all distinctly attack-minded. What is missing is the

player to bridge the two; a box-to-box midfielder. Jill Scott is England's only current prospect here however she has not played a full ninety minutes of international football for quite some time.

So, either the formation needs to be adjusted or the squad does. Enter Sarina Wiegman. As if she read our minds and collective disdain, Wiegman has come in and pleasingly changed things up. Wiegman has played variations of the 4-3-3, but she has also used a 3-5-2 formation and most recently a 4-2-3-1.

It is the 4-2-3-1 that needs to be delved in to. Wiegman used this system in England's first game of the Arnold Clark Cup against Canada, the first 'testing' side they had faced since her induction. Alessia Russo played as the sole striker

in front of Lauren Hemp, Ella Toone and Fran Kirby. Behind them sat England's usual defensive midfielder Keira Walsh alongside - drum-roll please - Leah Williamson in a double pivot.

To understand why this pivot works, we must first understand how the two play. Walsh is a technical ball player with the unfathomable vision to pick out passes that can switch momentum at the drop of a hat. Walsh is also deceptively strong and has no qualms tussling one-on-one to win over possession.

On the other hand, Williamson is naturally a more physical player who demonstrates a strength when using her body to shield and interrupt. Williamson likes to create pressure by carrying the ball directly yet is also known for her ability to accurately pinpoint switches of play.

Williamson's role within the England side has long been speculated. At club level, Williamson anchors the backline as a consistently well performing centre-half, however, her driving runs and proficient ball progression means she can easily slip into a higher position.

England are fortunate to boast the choice of several centre-backs; Lotte Wubben-Moy, Jess Carter, Steph Houghton, as well as the class talents of Millie Bright and Alex Greenwood. Therefore, pushing Williamson into a midfield role makes a lot of sense. It solves the conundrum of logistically playing Bright, Greenwood and Williamson at the same time whilst knitting the midfield into a more cohesive unit.

When using a double pivot, generally speaking, one player will remain close to the defensive line whilst the other moves more freely in supporting attacking phases of play. Interestingly, of the two, it is actually Williamson who is more likely to suit the progressive role despite playing as a defender in the domestic league. However, the beauty of the Walsh-Williamson pivot is that both can comfortably operate as either meaning they can be used interchangeably.

Defensively, this system offers a greater safety net. In times of pressure both Walsh and Williamson are able to fall back and protect the backline, in so creating a 'box' to close off central lanes in conjunction with the centre-backs. A Walsh-Williamson-Bright-Greenwood box is one that should be difficult to breach. Of course, this means oppositions will likely stretch play using the wings. However, a centre-back being dragged out wide to close down an approaching threat can be offset with a member of the double pivot dropping deep to cover.

In times of transition the pair can strike while the iron's hot in spraying equally exquisite passes to motion counter-attacks. Further to this, both are capable of becoming supporting bodies to their forward line harbouring the intelligence to do so without compromising defensive protection.

Having played together through the England ranks, Walsh and Williamson know each other's movements well enough to gauge the workings of the pivot between them. One

will remain deep whilst the other careers forward, one covers the centre-back whilst the other is alert to spring a counter, one draws the opponent whilst the other fills consequent the space.

The double pivot, by its nature, is a partnership, a constant give and pull between its two occupants. For England, the partnership of Keira Walsh and Leah Williamson has already shown great potential. In just a single game using the 4-2-3-1 system, the Lionesses looked sharp in what was arguably their best forty-five minutes of football in over two years. Their play purposely connected far more smoothly through the thirds and the resulting unity reasserted excitement in their stirring supporters.

With the Euro's in mind, Wiegman's decision to 'experiment' looks to be the best thing that could have happened to England. Whilst we cannot assume Wiegman will always stick to the 4-2-3-1, one certainly hopes it becomes a frequent occurrence. The Walsh-Williamson pivot is not yet perfect, but it's a start.

The 34-year-old was given the honour of captaining her country in the Pinatar Cup opener against Poland in Spain.

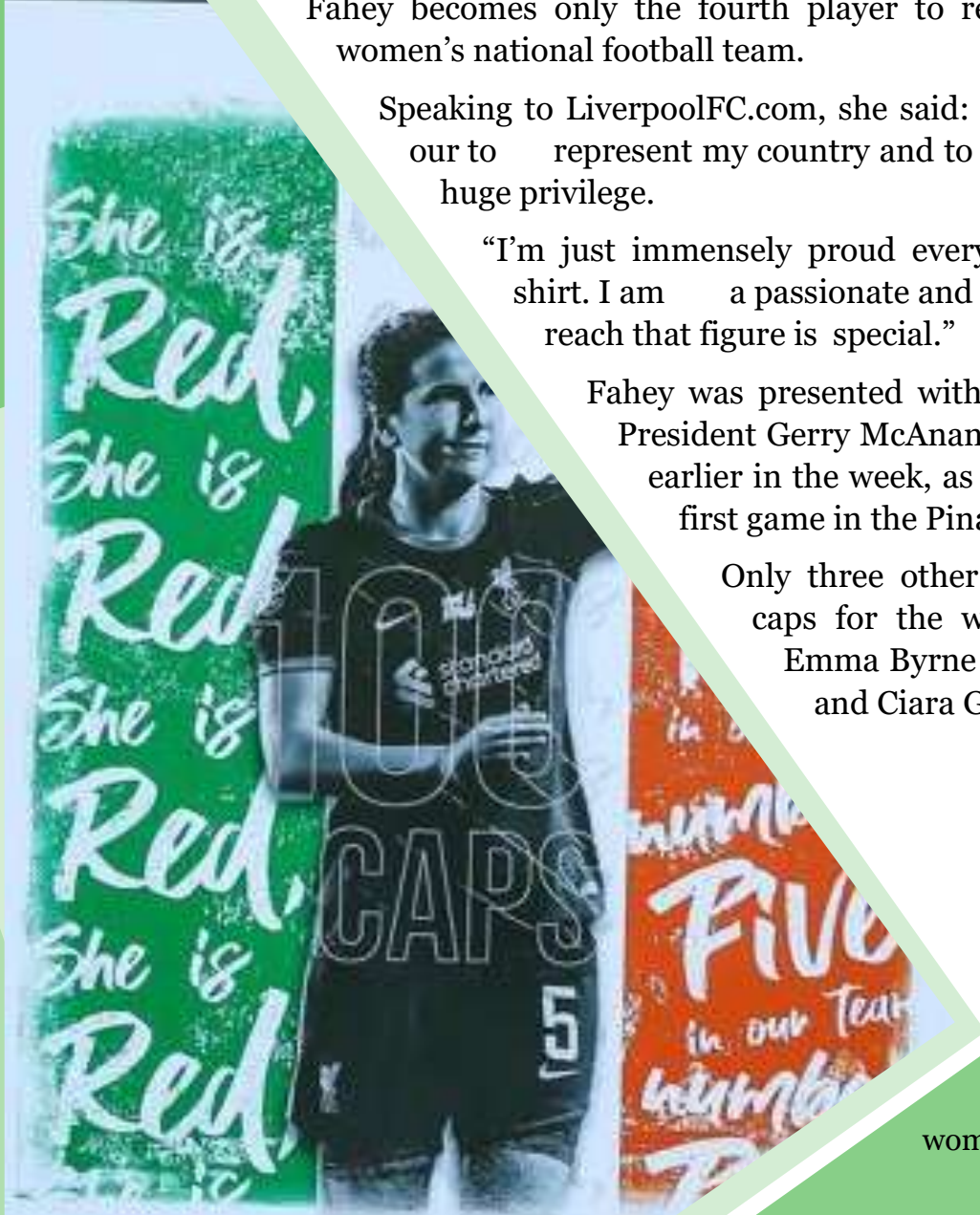
Fahey becomes only the fourth player to reach the milestone for the women's national football team.

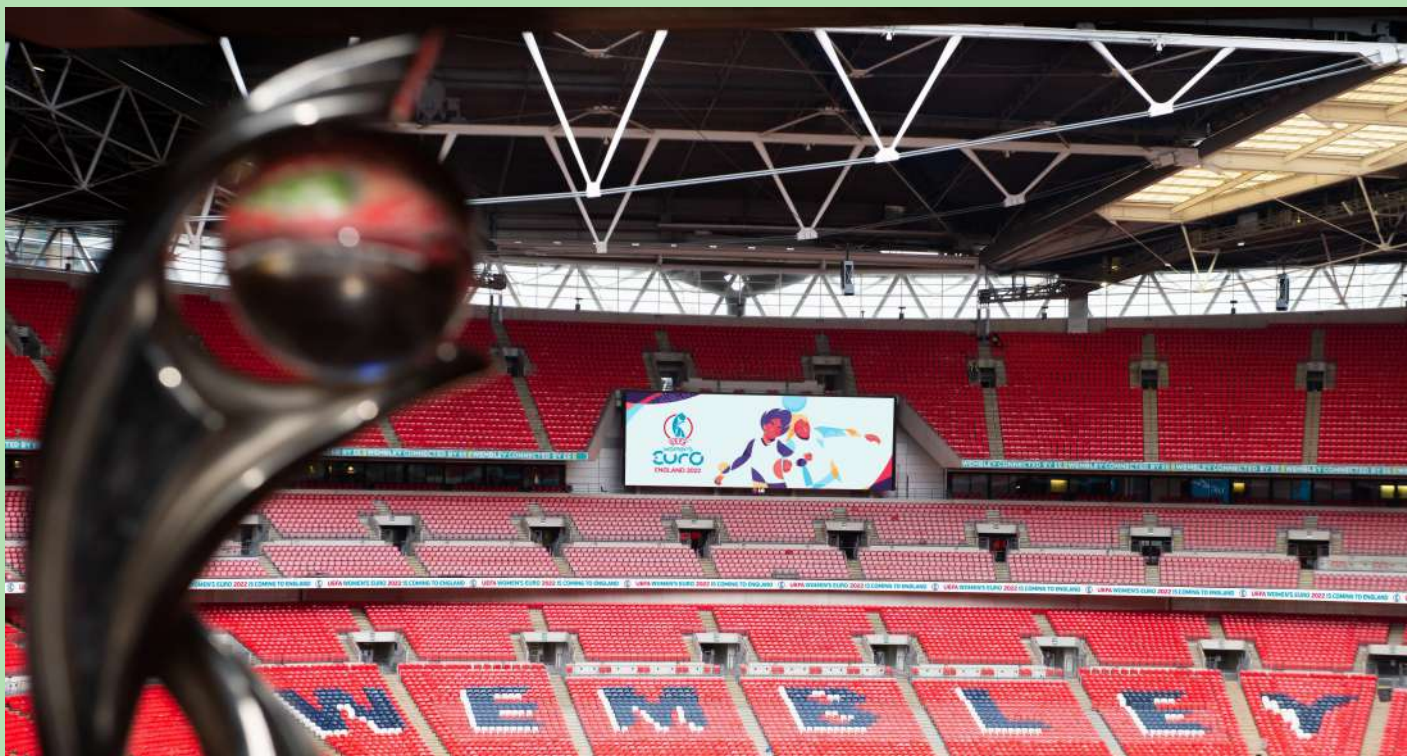

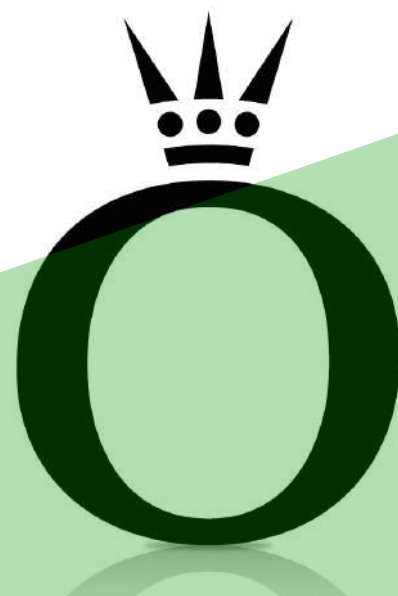

Russia banned from Euro 2022



Russian football clubs and national teams have been suspended from all Fifa and Uefa competitions following the country's invasion of Ukraine.

The world and European governing bodies have released a joint statement announcing tough sanctions in the wake of Russia taking military action against neighbouring Ukraine.

A number of national footballing federations had already announced that their teams will refuse to face Russia, including the English FA.

The decision rules the women's team out of this

summer's Euro 2022 competition, taking place in the UK.

FIFA and UEFA's statement reads: "Fifa/UEFA suspend Russian clubs and national teams from all competitions.

"Following the initial decisions adopted by the FIFA Council and the UEFA Executive Committee, which envisaged the adoption of additional measures, FIFA and UEFA have today decided together that all Russian teams, whether national representative teams or club teams, shall be suspended from participation in both FIFA

and UEFA competitions until further notice.

"These decisions were adopted today by the Bureau of the FIFA Council and the Executive Committee of UEFA, respectively the highest decision-making bodies of both institutions on such urgent matters.

"Football is fully united here and in full solidarity with all the people affected in Ukraine. Both Presidents hope that the situation in Ukraine will improve significantly and rapidly so that football can again be a vector for unity and peace amongst people."

Around the World



USA Women finally end equal pay battle



US Women's National Team players have ended a six-year legal battle with their federation over equal pay, agreeing a deal worth \$24m (£17.7m) plus bonuses to match the terms of the men.

The US Soccer Federation and the women's team announced the deal Tuesday, which will see the players receive \$22m, around a third of the figure they had originally sought.

US Soccer also agreed to establish a fund with \$2m to benefit the players in their post-soccer careers and charitable efforts aimed at growing the sport for women.

US Soccer committed to providing an equal rate of pay for the women's and men's national teams including World Cup bonuses, subject to collective bargaining agreements with the unions that separately represent the women and men.

"We are pleased to announce that, contingent on the negotiation of a new collective bargaining agreement, we will have resolved our longstanding dispute over equal

pay and proudly stand together in a shared commitment to advancing equality in soccer," the players said in a joint statement with US Soccer.

USA midfielder Megan Rapinoe said: "For our generation, knowing that we're going to leave the game in an exponentially better place than when we found it is everything.

"That's what it's all about because, to be honest, there is no justice in all of this if we don't make sure it never happens again.

"It's a herculean task to win a World Cup, certainly in the fashion we did with all that we were fighting for off the field and this felt just as herculean or probably bigger in so many ways. I'm excited about moving forward."

The FIFA World XI: Are you taking the mick?

Last month, FIFA announced the world's best 11 in women's football and this has caused a few concerns as familiar traditional faces returned but there were much better options available.

Let's be honest, the football awards in men and women's football is always having us fans sit and debate who is the greatest of them all.

From the Ballon d'Or to the Puskas Award – some of us are never satisfied with the results (don't get me started on Lionel Messi winning the 2021 Ballon d'Or!).

But this year's FIFA World XI for women's football felt like more as a joke than ever as some of the squad selections were very questionable.

In case you haven't seen it yet, here it is below and see what you think...

Before we get into the grilling, let's point out the players that made the 11 that deserved a spot in the world's finest after what was a very impressive 2021 for them individually.

Up front, Vivianne Miedema is like the Robert Lewandowski of women's football – you can always rely on the Dutch international to score you a goal no matter who it is against. She missed out on potential Olympics medal success last summer but has put that behind her to drive her Arsenal back at the top of the Women's Super League (so far!).

A second mention has to be Chelsea defender Millie Bright who has continued to be one of the best at the back helping the blues reach their first Champions League final in 2021. Unfortunately, the final against Barcelona was a night

to forget as her team conceded four goals. But they still made progress in Europe, they shouldn't forget that.

Lucy Bronze and Magdalena Eriksson are also defenders you can't go wrong with but you do feel having Bronze selected is because of her recent success of being awarded the FIFA Best Player award.

After that, this is where the questions start looking at the world 11.

With the goalkeepers, Christiane Endler had a terrific year gathering over 80% of cleansheets in 2021 while Chelsea's Ann-Katrin Berger was very close behind at 79%. Either choice was going to be a safe one.

The defender's group didn't seem right not to have Barcelona's centre back of Irene Paredes in the 11 as I'm sure many would have replaced Wendie Renard despite her career being a glittering one. Paredes was part of a Barcelona team that rarely lost in any competition last year and as this is being written – Paredes' team haven't lost a match in the Spanish league this season after over 20 games played so far.

Now let's have a look at the midfielders – where we straight away have to go on about Carli Lloyd as somehow the American made the list. Lloyd's appearance at Tokyo 2020 was to be her last major tournament for the USA. But to have her in the world 11 doesn't feel right as you feel it is more of a tribute to her international career instead of her contribution in 2021. It is a crime Barcelona's Alexia

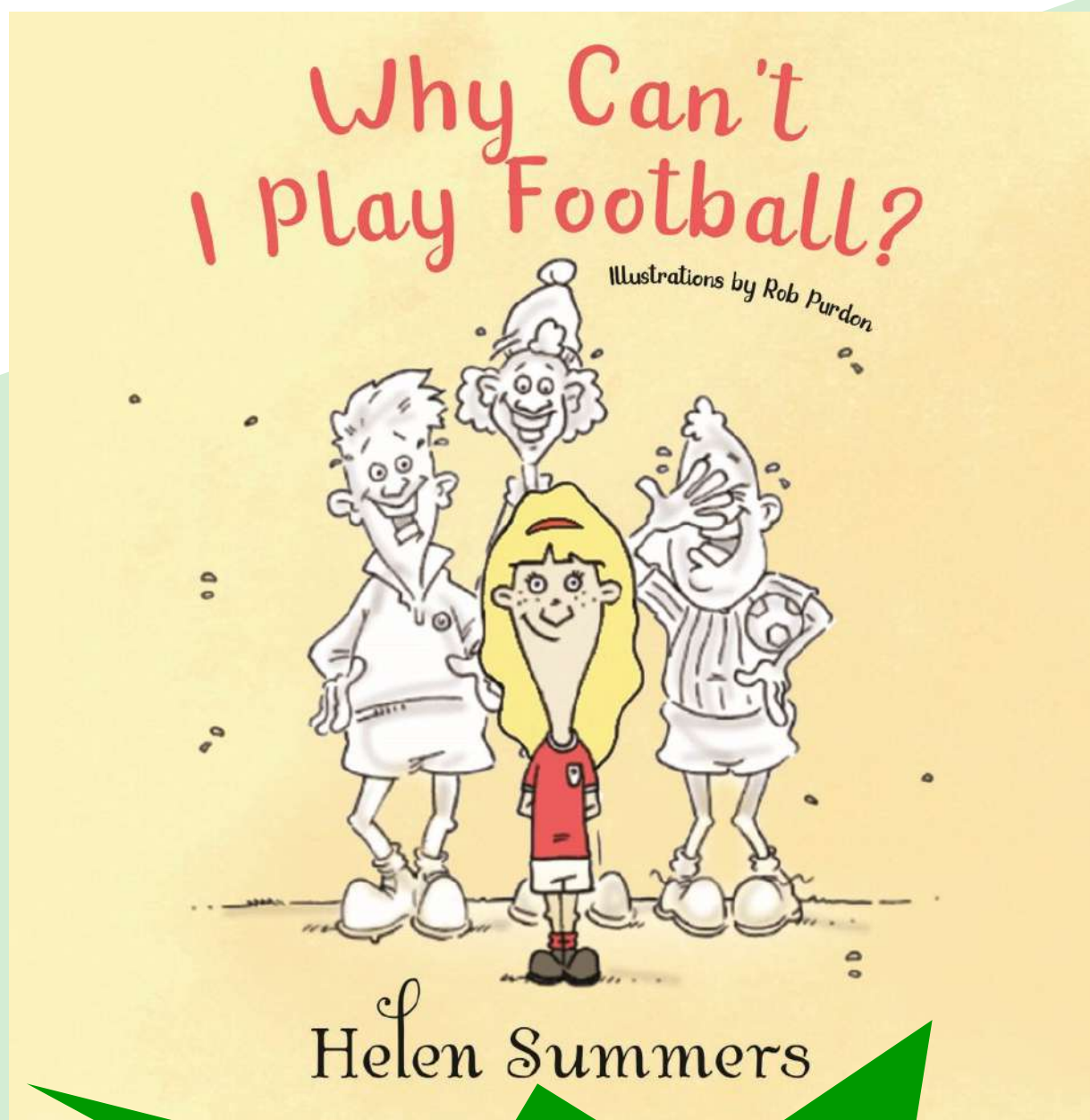
Putellas, who won the FIFA Ballon d'Or less than 2 months ago, not feature in this world 11. We love you Carli but Alexia needs to be there.

And finally the forwards, I already stated that Miedema has had a superb 2021 for Arsenal so it was expected to see her make the call but Marta and Megan Rapinoe feels like another traditionalist move by the voters where the past's greats never fail to make the list. But I'm afraid, I'll have to disagree with the Brazilian and the American and replace them with Chelsea's deadly duo of Sam Kerr and Pernille Harder who won every trophy for the blues apart from finishing just short of a first European cup back in May in Gothenburg. Kerr especially has been one of the most consistent up front for Emma Hayes by finding the net on so many occasions while also scoring that delicious chip in December's FA Cup final against Arsenal.

So a few suggested changes to the original world 11 list but at the end of the day, everyone's opinions are different but let's hope the choices are a lot more thought about in 2023 instead of going with the usual suspects.
